New York.—Present day scientific, ethical and philosophical theories will be employed in re-writing the Bible "in the light of the twentieth century," it has been announced by the Tyson Lectureship Foundation, which was organized Monday in the library of J. P. Morgan's home. The modern interpretation will be carried to all parts of the country by the Rev. Stuart L. Tyson, honorary vicar of the cathedral of St. John the Divine. The foundation was declared to have been incorporated to "make accessible to men and women in general the result of the research of modern scholars into the originals of the Christian religion and its interpretation and particularly in regard to the Bible. "Modern critical and historical research has given us back our Bible; it is no longer an impossible book, full of moral and intellectual stumbling blocks. . . . Man is as incurably religious as in former days and is eagerly asking for a faith which shall be at once consonant with reason and
