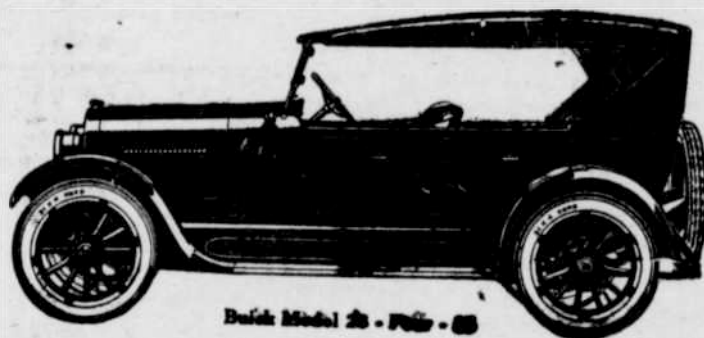

Depositors Meet

A meeting of the depositors of the Bank of Nyssa was held Thursday evening at the Commercial Club rooms to consider the best method of procedure in handling the situation. About 50 depositors were present.

B. W. Buikderbeck of Boise was present and outlined a plan by which the depositors would realize the maximum amount of their deposits with little delay instead of waiting two or three years until the affairs of the bank could be wound up by the receiver. The plan briefly was for the depositors to form an organization, appoint a committee to examine the financial condition of the bank and report back to the depositors, who would then be in a position to entertain a proposition from a firm of capitalists who, Mr. Buikderbeck stated, was ready to make an offer for the securities as an investment.

This plan was favorably received and the organization was formed by the election of C. F. Eder as president and M. M. Blodgett as secretary. The committee elected was C. F. Eder, E. M. Blodgett and E. C. Wilson.

Mr. Buikderbeck, who is one of the heaviest depositors, is optimistic over the condition of the bank and stated that he was pleasantly surprised at the strength of the bank as revealed by the last bank statement.
