My Trip to Corvallis

I am going to tell you some of the things we did at Corvallis, then you will know why I had such a wonderful time while there. Mr. and Mrs. Kinder came out to my home Thursday afternoon and took me home with them. Two other club members besides myself stayed there that night. The next morning, June 8, we got up at 4:30, met some more of the bunch (Mr. and Mrs. Hotchkiss and Danton Humphrey) at the garage and were off at 6 o'clock. We went to Ontario first where Mrs. Turner and her small son and Floyd Parks were waiting for us. Floyd is a club member from Jordan Valley.

We had fine roads most all the way. The Meacham hill was in pretty good shape when we went over it the first time, but it was awful muddy coming back. We had to walk over six miles and the mud was shoemaking deep in the driest places we could find to walk. We arrived in Pendleton about 6 o'clock Friday evening. Supper was the first thing we thought of and we cooked and ate it outside in the auto park, then went to the hotel to get our rooms and from there to the moving picture show. We cooked and ate all our meals outside excepting one while traveling. Everyone was ready to travel at 7 o'clock Saturday morning.

We reached Hermiston about noon, where we picked up Madge Quick who was to meet us there. We were in The Dalles about 8 o'clock and intended to spend the night there until we saw the condition the auto park was in and decided to move to Hood River. Got there about 6 o'clock and found such a nice park and good water that we were not sorry that we had left The Dalles. We had only been in Hood River about half an hour when it started to rain a little and kept it up all night. That very same night they had a hard rain in The Dalles and washed out the whole camp ground, so we considered ourselves lucky. We girls slept in pup tents part of the time instead of going to the hotel and the boys slept outside. No one got to bed very early Saturday night, so we weren't very anxious to get up Sunday morning but had breakfast and were all ready to start by 7 o'clock Sunday afternoon we stopped at the Vista House, which is between Hood River and Portland, and stayed about an hour there. At 9:55 the lights flicker twice as a warning and go out at 10. If you aren't in bed by that time you have to find your way in the dark, for the lights are not turned on any more. Tuesday our class work started. The rising bell rings at 7:15 and we had an hour to get ready for breakfast. After breakfast everyone had to clean up his room and there was a contest on between the boys and the girls to see who could keep the cleanest rooms. The girls won. Classes start at 8 o'clock. My subjects were First Aid, Preparation of Lunch, Decorative
