

# Farm Pointer

A source of supply of clover for spring planting on the fall grain should be looked up now. The value of the seed may be determined by having purity and germination tests made on the seed selected. Testing of seed is done free of charge by the State seed laboratory.

A successful farmer is the one who takes advantage of the experience of others. Bearing this in mind, the farmer who can make the best use of his time at this season of the year by catching up on the reading he has neglected during the summer months.

A new spray calendar for Oregon will be published in the Oregonian on about February 1. For the first time in Oregon a bulletin of this kind, a special program for spraying in semi-arid fruit sections has been included.

It is possible to be successful in raising chickens where a turkey would be set. Chickens are more efficient than turkey in raising in crop production from wheat, barley oats, corn, apples, and peaches for 1923. The amount to \$2,184.50. Farmers should bear this in mind. The Reclaiming Raw Oregon. The Reclamation of Oregon land is apparently the most important factor in the larger population and the state wealth. This increase in state wealth leads to a lower rate. By similar processes in various counties have cut the rate in half. Such little savings in the cost of the administrative government as our legislators are able to make these saving economies are added by our total tax. More state wealth; more people to care for; more of the raw resources of the state—this is the solution of the problem.

Therefore water so applied to make a ton of alfalfa grow where a pound of bunch grass and a bush grew is the problem to be solved before we shall see taxation at this state lower.

In a series of articles on irrigation in Oregon gathered by a Telegram staff writer after an exhaustive survey of the irrigation district of state and a study of their condition it was shown that legislation is needed to correct the following evils:

(1) Too little care taken in setting irrigation districts; (2) development left in the hands of interested contractors, thus making improvements cost too much; (3) bonds issued and sold by irrigation boards who have autocratic power and checks by higher power. All these evils overload the land with taxes land cannot bear. In some instances such unwise management has put previously profitable farms that are now unprofitable under dry conditions, while lands prepared for settlement have been prepared at so great expense that they cannot be sold at a price that will attract settlers.

These are major evils that have not halted further irrigation development. The remedies suggested here: Provide for the recall of irrigation boards of directors if they prove to be unfit for their work; more teeth in the present irrigation laws to eliminate graft and in free and open competition not in construction of irrigation works but in the bidding on bonds. Appoint an irrigation commission that shall be so constituted as to give more careful attention to irrigation affairs. So direct the security commission that they shall apply no irrigation project that does not fairly promise to succeed.

Finally let there be a definite organization plan which will select the rural Oregon with colored belts only. Such farm immigrants shall hereafter get into this state only if they have a definite plan of coming from other farming sections of the United States; and they shall come only to homes that demand for their building a life and a broken back. A definite colonization scheme is indispensable to the reclamation of Oregon developed land—Portland Telegram.

### TO THE HONORABLE COUNTY COURT OF MALHEUR COUNTY, STATE OF OREGON:

The undersigned, being owners of more than fifty per cent of the acreage of the contiguous body of alkali, wet and overflow land in Malheur County, State of Oregon, hereinafter described, do hereby petition your honorable body to cause to be organized a drainage district for the purpose of having lands reclaimed and protected from the effects of water, for sanitary and agricultural purposes and for the convenience and welfare of the public utility and benefit; and for the purpose of this petition we state the following matters as required by Chapter 340 of the General Laws of Oregon, for the year 1915:

1. The name proposed for such District is Owyhee Drainage District.

2. The boundary lines of the proposed District are as follows: Beginning at the corner of sections 28, 35, 36 and 38, T. 20 S., R. 40 E.; thence east to the west bank of Owyhee river; thence south and west along west bank of Owyhee river to a point where said bank intersects south boundary of section 35; thence west to southwest corner section 35; thence north one mile; thence east to place of beginning. All being in Malheur County, State of Oregon.

3. The total acreage included in the said proposed district is 600.2 acres.

4. The names of the owners of the land in said proposed District, as shown by the records of Malheur County, Oregon, and the acreage owned by each of said owners is as follows:

5. The proposed reclamation and protection of said lands is for sanitary and agricultural purposes; and such reclamation and protection will be conducive to the public health and welfare, and of public utility and benefit.

6. All of the lands included in said proposed District are properly included therein, and will be beneficially affected by the operations of the proposed District.

7. The benefits of such proposed reclamation and protection will exceed the damage to be done; and the best interest of the land included, and of the owners of such land as a whole and of the public at large, will be promoted by the formation and proposed operation of said District.

8. The formation of the Drainage District, under the provisions of Chapter 340 of the General Laws of Oregon for 1915 under the provisions of which this petition is proposed, is a proper and advantageous method of accomplishing the reclamation and protection of the land in said proposed Drainage District.

9. The proposed plan for the reclamation and protection of the property in the proposed District is by system of the drains properly designed and located to carry off drainage water.

The land included in the proposed District is so situated that without ditches being constructed and water is not drained off the land remains cold and salt.

10. The signers of this petition agree that they will pay any and all expenses incurred, and any tax or taxes that may be levied against their respective lands for the purpose of paying the expense of organizing or attempting to organize the proposed district, such expense to be taxed against the lands of the signers in proportion to the number of acres owned by them and affected by the proposed drainage.

11. WHEREFORE, your petitioners pray that the lands described herein, or such of them as may be found by the court to be properly included in the proposed drainage district, either permanently or until further investigation and surveys may permit elimination shall be declared organized into a drainage district under the provisions of Chapter 340 of the General Laws of Oregon for the year 1915.
