### Big Still Captured

Federal officers from Idaho, together with Sheriff Allumbaugh of Ada county and Sheriff Mason of Canyon county, captured a big moonshiner's outfit on Bridge Island, one mile south of Nyssa, Friday afternoon last and arrested Charles Oleson, who is accused of operating it. Oleson is in jail on a federal charge of manufacturing liquor.

The outfit was an enormous affair, equipped with every device known to the moonshiner, and was located in the Robert Clark residence near the railroad bridge. The still was said to have a capacity of 70 gallons per 24 hours. The cooker, 150 gallons capacity, was seven feet high and three feet wide. The officers poured out 40 gallons of moonshine, dumped about 1000 barrels of mash and 100 gallons of beer.

### May Have City Park

At the regular monthly meeting of the Commercial Club Wednesday evening the matter of purchasing a block of land near the ball park for a city park was taken up and action taken looking to its acquisition by the city for that purpose. It is understood the property can be bought for a nominal sum and Mayor P. M. Warren was appointed a committee to secure funds with which to finance the deal.

This matter was taken up by the city council a few months ago, at which a committee from the Commercial Club was present, and F. E. Young was instructed to ascertain what the property could be secured for. He has been unable to secure definite figures, but estimates the cost will not exceed \$100. Nearly half of this amount was subscribed at the meeting Wednesday evening. Mr. Young was instructed to conclude negotiations for purchase of the park site as soon as possible. The grounds can be irrigated from the low pressure water system at a small cost, and by seeding to grass and planting trees and flowers it can soon be made a beauty spot of which our citizens may well be proud.
