Extend Open Season

Albert Cook is in receipt of the following letter from the office of the State Fish and Game Commission in answer to his letter and petition asking that the open season on China Pheasants be extended to 30 days:

Mr. Albert Cook, Dear Sir—The State Game Commission is in receipt of your letter of the 23rd inst., together with the petition from the sportsmen and farmers of Malheur county, asking that the open season for hunting Chinese Pheasants in Malheur be extended for a period of 30 days in October, setting up the claim that these birds are so plentiful that the extended shooting season will not put them in any danger of extinction.

Replying to same have to advise you that at the July meeting of the commission an order was adopted extending the shooting season in Malheur county from the second Sunday in October to the fourth Sunday in October, both dates inclusive. This order will provide an open season from October 14 to October 28, making a two weeks open season and three Sundays' shooting, and extending the present open

season in that county one week. The former order allowed but one week's shooting season, namely: From the second Sunday in October to the third Sunday in October.

For your information, the sportsmen and farmers present, will say that your letter and petition will be brought to the attention of the commission at its next regular meeting on August 13, and you will be advised of whatever action is taken in the matter.
