"SO SAY WE ALL."

It is a strange fact those who shirk assuming responsibility for their acts resort to the anonymous attack to strike from behind. Anonymous communications are like poisoned letters, they seek to tear down and ruin under the guise of innuendo. The anonymous communication is an old enemy in the average newspaper office. They come with every mail but they never see the light of day. We suspect the above clipping, which was handed into the Journal office for publication by Rev. Fleming, was intended for a sly dig at the Journal for permitting the publication of communications without the authors' real names being signed to them. If so, the blow never touched us. The right of a newspaper to publish communications signed by fictitious names will not be questioned, we believe, even by the Boise Statesman, from which the above was quoted. The point made by the Boise paper was that communications which came to the office unsigned, "without some means of identification," are fit only for the waste basket. And so they are. However, all newspapers print communications, otherwise unobjectionable, without the author's real names being signed, provided he gives his real name into the office. The requirement is that all communications for publication must be signed by the author's real name, not necessarily for publication but as an evidence of good faith. That requirement has been fulfilled in every instance in recent communications in the Journal. The writers are bona fide people living in this community and can be produced whenever we see fit. In the meantime the Journal will assume any odium that attaches to their publication. We do not necessarily agree with all the statements made, but are not so narrow that we would deny anyone the right to express his views. Nor would we accuse anyone of attacking the Bible or the church because his views differ from ours. We would be a good enough sport to try to meet his arguments in fair debate, or if we could not do that, would keep quiet. Peevishness in a case of this kind is an admission of defeat.

To the Land Owners of the Nyssa-Arcadia Drainage District: Having been duly appointed by the Board of Supervisors, as provided by law, to audit the books of the Treasurer and investigate the financial condition of the District, we report our findings as follows: On October 3, 1922, the Board of Supervisors met and approved the estimated amount of expenditures for the year beginning January 1, 1923, as compiled by the Budget Committee, in amount of \$31,843.08. The amount of taxes received during the current year is \$11,578.06. Uncollected taxes accruing since the date of organization is \$9,735.90. We have made a careful audit of the Treasurer's books and find all moneys duly and regularly accounted for.
