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Frank O. Carman

Passes Away Sat.

Funeral services were held here Tuesday at the Presbyterian church for Frank O. Carman, whose death occurred at his home in Nyssa, Saturday, January 5, 1924.

Mr. Carman was born in Allegan county, Michigan, March 13, 1859, and died at the age of 64 years, 9 months and 23 days. He was a resident of Michigan for a period of 42 years, where he met and was united in marriage to Miss Phoebe Faxon on June 28, 1884. Of this union was born one child, a daughter, Mrs. Alice Broers, who resides in Everett, Wash. Mr. Carman lived a devoted Christian life and was of a noble character. He first joined the church in the year 1884. Upon his arrival in Nyssa he joined the Presbyterian church here. He moved with his family to the state of Wisconsin about the year 1901 and resided there for seven years, then visited the state of Texas for a short time, finally arriving in Nyssa, Oregon, in the year 1909.

For many years before he came to Nyssa Mr. Carman was a member of the I. O. O. F. lodge and joined the Nyssa chapter of this lodge in the beginning of that chapter. Owing to his failing health he was compelled to give up his lodge work, which was a matter of deep regret to him, as he was an active member.

He leaves besides his wife and daughter, two grandchildren, two brothers and one sister, the latter residents of Michigan. A host of friends and neighbors mourn his loss, as it has been fittingly remarked that "not one unworthy act could be held against him."

About four years ago Mr. Carman suffered a stroke of paralysis in his right side, but he had apparently regained fairly good health. The morning of his demise he arose as usual and after doing his few outdoor chores he came in and prepared to eat his breakfast. Just in the very act of sitting down at the table another stroke came and quickly reached his heart and he passed away almost at once. His last remark was: "It is the end; it is God's will." He was prepared to meet it bravely and was found worthy. The body will be shipped to Everett, Wash., for burial.

"A noble soul has passed from earth, A noble heart is stilled. His kindest acts are not forgot; Remember, 'Tis God's will."

All persons owning or claiming an interest in lands described in said petition are hereby notified to appear at said place on said date and show cause, if any there be, why the prayer in said petition should not be granted.

PETITION

IN THE COUNTY COURT OF THE STATE OF OREGON, FOR THE COUNTY OF MALHEUR.

To the Honorable County Court of Malheur County, State of Oregon:

The undersigned being owners of more than fifty per cent of the acreage of the contiguous body of alkali, wet and overflow land in Malheur County, Oregon, hereinafter described, do hereby petition your honorable body to cause to be organized a drainage district for the purpose of having such lands reclaimed and protected from the effects of water, for sanitary and agricultural purposes and for the convenience and welfare of the public utility and benefit; and for the purpose of this petition we state the following matters, as are required by Chapter 840 of the General Laws of Oregon, for the year 1915.

1. The name proposed for such district is WARD DRAINAGE DISTRICT.

2. The boundary lines of the proposed Drainage District are as follows: Commencing at the quarter corner on the North side of Section 6, Township 20 South, Range 47 East; thence west one half mile; thence South one-half mile; thence west to the east bank of the Owyhee ditch; thence along said east bank of the Owyhee ditch in southerly direction to a point where said east bank of Owyhee ditch intersects the south line of Section 1, Township 20 S., Range 46 E. thence east to the south quarter corner to Section 6; thence north one-quarter mile; thence east 660 feet; thence north to the north line of Section 6; thence west to point of beginning.

3. The total acreage included in the said proposed Drainage District is 445 acres.

4. The names of the owners of the land in said proposed Drainage District as shown by the record of Malheur County, Oregon, and the acreage owned by each of said owners is as follows:

5. The proposed reclamation and protection of said lands is for sanitary and agricultural purposes; and such proposed reclamation and protection will be conducive to the public health and welfare, and of public utility and benefit.

6. All of the lands included in said proposed district are properly included therein, and will be beneficially affected by the operations of the proposed district.

7. The benefits of such proposed reclamation and protection will exceed the damage to be done; and the best interest of the land included, and of the owners of such land as a whole and of the public at large, will be promoted by the formation and proposed operation of said district.

8. The formation of a drainage district under the provisions of Chapter 840 of the General Laws of Oregon for 1915, under the provisions of which this petition is proposed, is a proper and advantageous method of accomplishing the reclamation and protection of the land in the said proposed Drainage District.

9. The proposed plan for the reclamation and protection of the land in said proposed drainage district is by tile drains. There will be constructed two 12 inch tile drains, one of which will be on Chas. Garrison's land, and the other on the land owned by Karl Ward, Frank Ward and Audrey J. Ward, and meeting at a common drain on line between their land and Robert M. Brown's and thence to the River.

The land in the proposed district is so situated that, without ditches being constructed, the water is not drained off and the water remains ponded and

sour.

10. The signers to this petition agree that they will pay any and all expenses incurred and any tax or taxes that may be levied against their respective lands for the purpose of paying of organizing or attempting to organize the proposed district, such expense to be taxes against the lands of the signers in proportion to the number of acres owned by them and affected by the proposed drainage.

11. WHEREFORE, your petitioners pray that the lands described herein, or such of them as may be found by the Court to be properly included in the proposed drainage district, either permanently or until further investigation and surveys may permit elimination, shall be declared organized into a drainage district under the provision of Chapter 840 of the General Laws of Oregon for the year 1915.

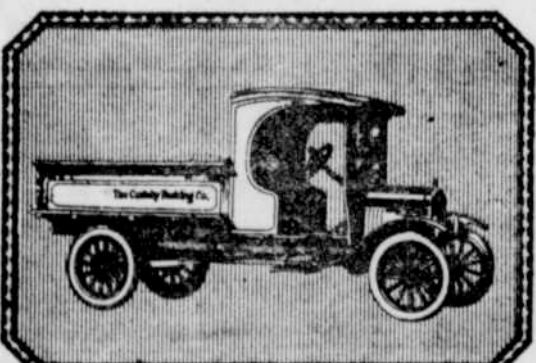
