

QUAKERS TO HANDLE GERMAN RELIEF WORK

Funds Collected Will Be Spent in America. Says Major-General Allen.

Official word from Major-General Henry T. Allen, national chairman of the American committee for relief of German children, received by Robert H. Strong, Oregon state chairman, last week at headquarters, 715 Corbett building, Portland, is that all money collected in this country will be used to buy foodstuffs in America for shipment to Germany. There the materials will be distributed by the American Quakers, who have organized to do this great work.

General Allen also wired the Oregon headquarters that relief funds are being collected in Berlin and Bremen and other places for aiding women and children. This is vouched for by American investigators there.

In Portland, the German-speaking members of 26 churches of all denominations and of 28 societies, following action taken at a mass meeting at the outset of this campaign, have contributed several thousand dollars toward this relief fund. It is also announced that they have been collecting relief funds regularly for at least three years to alleviate suffering in their native land.

In a state-wide collection, authorized by officials of the Catholic churches in Oregon, a substantial sum was realized on Sunday. Every Catholic church in the state participated.

Portland labor unions have been subscribing various sums, also, and the Central council there has a special committee of union members working on solicitation, following formal endorsement of the campaign.

COST OF HELP IS SMALL

Will You Save Any Starving German Babies?

Two cents a day, in American money, will save one starving German baby in that war-ridden country, according to a schedule worked out by the American committee for relief of German children, which is now gathering a relief fund of \$10,000,000 for this purpose throughout the United States, with Major-General Henry T. Allen, former commander of American troops on the Rhine, as national chairman. President Coolidge, Herbert Hoover and others of their type have endorsed the campaign.

Robert H. Strong, who was state chairman of the Hoover food campaign in 1921 in Oregon, is state chairman of this campaign, with headquarters in room 715 Corbett building, Portland.

How many babies will you save? Unless America saves them, through private charity, they will perish, says Herbert Hoover.

Portland Saves 8000 German Babies

Portland people in two weeks subscribed \$24,000 toward relief for German children, who are included in the millions in Germany who face starvation because, as Herbert Hoover expressed it, of the economic breakdown, following the world war.

As the American committee for relief of German children has shown it costs two cents per meal to feed a child one hot meal daily in Germany. This means that the people of Portland have saved 8000 children for 150 days.

"We never fought children," said Major-General Allen, head of the nation-wide relief campaign, and the people are showing they support his declaration. The state-wide campaign for this relief work is getting nicely under way, too, with a good response from the people everywhere.

Noted Army Chaplain Pleads for Babies

Rev. Dr. John W. Beard, pastor of the Mount Tabor Presbyterian church, Portland, chaplain of Portland post of the American Legion and chaplain of one of the companies of the famous 91st Division overseas, is a strong champion of the campaign to save German children from starvation and never loses an opportunity to say something for that cause.

"We fought and conquered the German militarists," said the noted chaplain, "but, as Major-General Henry T. Allen, commander of the American troops on the Rhine during the occupation, said, 'We never fought children.' We helped win the war as such, but, as when we were fighting the enemy, we bound up his wounds if captured, we now shall bind up the terrible wounds inflicted by war's awful fury against these little ones who suffer so. Let's help feed them, by all means."

RECRUITING OFFICER AT BURNS THIS MONTH

Sergeant Peter C. Peterson, from the regular army recruiting office, Pendleton, Oregon, will be in Burns, Oregon, on recruiting duty from February 12th to 21st inclusive. Sergeant Peterson is authorized to make enlistments for practically any camp or station on the Atlantic or Pacific Coasts, Mexican Border, Hawaii or Panama. The Sergeant is making special effort to secure men for the 16th Infantry, which is situated at Governor's Island, Statue of Liberty and Fort Wadsworth, all in New York Harbor. Five cents car fare from any of the stations to 42nd street and Broadway, New York City. The 16th Infantry was the first regiment of infantry to go to France during the World War and the last to return.

Men enlisting for the 16th Infantry and other organizations on the Atlantic Coast, will be sent from San Francisco, California, by transport through the Panama canal to New York City.

MOTOR LICENSE PLATES FOR 1924

LINCOLN'S GETTYSBURG ADDRESS

Fourscore and seven years ago our fathers brought forth upon this continent a new nation, conceived in liberty, and dedicated to the proposition that all men are created equal. Now we are engaged in a great civil war, testing whether that nation, or any nation so conceived and so dedicated, can long endure.

We are met on a great battlefield of that war. We have come to dedicate a portion of that field as a final resting place for those who here gave their lives that that nation might live. It is altogether fitting and proper that we should do this. But in a larger sense we can not dedicate, we can not consecrate, we can not hallow this ground. The brave men, living and dead, who struggled here, have consecrated it far above our power to add or detract, the world will little note, nor long remember, what we say here, but it can never forget what they did here. It is for us, the living, rather to be dedicated here to the unfinished work which they who fought here have thus far so nobly advanced. It is rather for us to be here dedicated to the great

task remaining before us, that from these honored dead we take increased devotion, to that cause for which they gave the last full measure of devotion; that we here highly resolve that these dead shall not have died in vain; that this nation, under God, shall have a new birth of freedom, and that government of the people, by the people, and for the people, shall not perish from the earth.
