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SWAGLER FOR CONGRESS

For the first time in the history of this county one of its citizens is seeking the nomination for congress.

One of the important political announcements of this week was that Ralph W. Swagler, one of the leading attorneys of Malheur county, for the democratic nomination for Congress from this district. Mr. Swagler is so well known in this county and his success in his profession has been so universally recognized that he needs no introduction to the citizens of this community.

He received his common school education in the public schools of Minnesota and shortly after graduating from the law department of the University of Minnesota, commenced the practice of his profession at Ontario. In his professional work he has met with singular success and is recognized as one of the leading young lawyers of Eastern Oregon. He served one term as district attorney of this county with great success, and for two years was one of the officers of the District Attorneys association of the state. He has been active in public life of his party, not only in this county, but in the democratic national campaign in 1920, and has a host of democratic friends throughout the district who have urged his candidacy. We know that we express the sentiment of all the people of this vicinity when we say that, regardless of politics, his candidacy will meet with popular approval, and that his force, vigor and forensic ability will make him a prominent figure in congress.

For many years the democratic nomination has gone by default to J. M. Graham of Baker. He has not been a formidable candidate in the general election. If nominated Swagler will make an active campaign in the general election. Owyhee Graduation

Address delivered by E. L. MacLafferty at the Owyhee school house upon the graduation of Nova Larson, Myrtle Pullen and Nellie Elliott, February 21, 1924.

We have not met tonight so much to say farewell to these young people, as to mark the time when they are about to say farewell to the Owyhee school.

The mothers of these young ladies can well remember the first day of school for the little girl. You can easily recall how, all that day, as you went about your work, your thoughts were with the little one. You carefully counted the years when she would complete the course given in this school and, with credit to herself and honor to you, pass on to higher work. After so many years of trial and care this dream is being fulfilled to you tonight.

At a time like this good council, caution or advice is offered on every hand; but in this we shall try to be reasonable. Whatever may be our task in life let us not wonder if we shall fail, but rather think how we shall succeed. And, as you mount the ladder of success, remember the climbers below, and avoid cleaning your shoes on the ground above, but rather extend

a helping hand to the one beneath. Remember that neither the physical nor the intellectual conquest of an opponent affords the greatest satisfaction in life. Often the conqueror is too conscious of having made an enemy or wounded a friend. Rather conquer thine own self, cultivate the gentle virtues—sympathy, kindness, patience and truth. Even display that "ornament of a meek and quiet spirit which is in the sight of God of great price." "To thine own self be true and it must follow as the night the day thou canst not be false to anyone."

Again, a man may be known by the company he keeps, but he is certain proved by the company that he repels. The former he may sometimes deceive, but the latter almost never. Choose your friends with care, but select your enemies with caution. Your friends will be a personal help to you; but out in the world where, unknown to you, he goes about reviling you, a well selected enemy is your best asset. But, rather than follow a multitude in wrong, stand like Pompey's pillar, conspicuous by thyself and single in thine integrity.

Tonight you have listened to the reading of a brief history of the Owyhee school, covering a period of 27 years. May I ask you to go with me, in your imagination, the same distance into the future. Twenty seven years from now great changes will have taken place in the old Owyhee district. Twenty seven years hence, many of your good parents, and perhaps a brother or a sister, will be sleeping in yonder church yard. Many who have labored and planned and saved to give you this advantage will have passed away, and the burdens of this community will have devolved upon you. So conduct your life that, when the time shall come to say farewell to father or mother there may be no regrets. And to the parents who have gathered here tonight:

"So live that when thy summons comes to join
That innumerable caravan that moves
To that mysterious realm, where each
shall take
His chamber in the silent halls of death,
Thou go not like the quarry slave at night
Scourged to his dungeon but, sustained
and soothed
By an unfaltering trust, approach thy
grave
Like one who wraps the drapery of
his couch
About him and lies down to pleasant
dreams."

At the close of a busy day, as the western sun was sinking low, we dreamed, while we watched the shadows creep across the lawn. How like the span of a human life is that life as it stretches cross the field, never to return. We dreamed of passing along your broad thoroughfare and viewing your fields of waving grain so far as the eye could reach, dotted here and there by the cottage of the prosperous farmer. On the site of the old school house there stood a two story brick building. We read in bold letters carved in the headstone above the main entrance: "Owyhee high school erected 1930." We crossed the well kept ground and entered the building by a side door, where we met the janitor, who kindly directed us to the principal's office. As we approached the great door at the end of the long corridor we read, lettered in gold, "Kenneth McDonald, principal." We turned the knob and the door swung backward, revealing a well appointed high school office. About the long library table in the center of the room were gathered three middle aged ladies. Evidently Prof. McDonald was holding a meeting with his board of directors. As they appeared to be strangers, we apologized and were about to withdraw when familiar voices bade us enter. A surprise indeed! But what mean those gray hairs, and that severe dignity of manner? Truly old time is a cruel tyrant. Yes, 27 years from now Nova Larson, Myrtle Pullen and Nellie Elliott, honorable directors of the

Owyhee district. We entered and spent a pleasant hour recalling the events of 27 years ago.

The bell rang, yes, the same old bell so familiar to our ears, and we passed across the office out upon a wide balcony overlooking the play ground. Here, stretched across the green beneath the canopy of poplar and locust were 150 boys and girls of the Owyhee school 27 years from now. The old bell tapped and they passed to their respective rooms and we returned to the principal's office.

Prof. McDonald suggested that we end the afternoon in the building and visit the grades, to which we assented. The professor then led the way to the high school room where we found Robert Kaylor putting the class through a lively exercise in computing the volume of cylinders, cones, pyramids and spheres. We then passed to the eighth grade room where we found Rowena Glenn, in her quiet way, leading the grammar class through the analysis of a difficult sentence. In the intermediate department we found Betty Kaylor reigning like a queen, in the hearts of her boys and girls. In the primary room Garada Elliott presided over the little tots. At last Garada had come to realize the ambition of her youth.
