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BIBLE IN THE SCHOOLS.

One of the recommendations adopted at a recent convention of the Methodist church was that a determined effort be made to compel the teaching of the Bible in the public schools.

Saying nothing about the injustice of such a course to those who do not believe in the Bible and yet are compelled to help support the schools and to send their children to school, it seems to the Journal that there are insuperable difficulties in the way of its satisfactory working. The Bible is a book that requires expert interpretation to arrive at its meaning, and it is not believed that all teachers, or a large proportion of them, are such experts. Furthermore, it is difficult to find two such experts who will agree on all the important questions of the Bible. For instance, the Methodists believe in "free will" and can quote numerous passages to show that "whosoever will may come." The Presbyterians believe in predestination and can quote passages from the Bible that state as plainly as language can that only those who are called can be saved. For example: "Having predestinated

us unto the adoption of children by Jesus Christ to himself, according to the good pleasure of his will."—Eph. 1:5

Then there is our old friend the Sabbath question. There are few questions that cause more dissension and strife than it, but it is a question that would have to be faced if the Bible should be taught in the schools. There are three different days observed by people who are patrons of our public schools. How satisfy them all?

The question of baptism would also probably cause more or less irritation, a number of antagonistic beliefs regarding it being held by different denominations. Also the question of slavery. The righteousness of slavery is apparently taught in the Bible, but the teacher who would interpret the Bible to that effect today would get into trouble.

Some believe that the soul is naturally immortal and goes directly to heaven or hell at death. Others believe that the soul is immortal only as it is redeemed by Christ and sleeps in the grave until the resurrection.

Any number of similar questions could be cited to show that the teaching of the Bible in the schools would cause strife and neighborhood rows and defeat the end desired.

We call attention to the interesting fact that one of the leading periodicals of the country, the Dearborn Independent, has put up to its readers the very same proposition the Gate City Journal advanced in these columns several months ago, and which to date has not been satisfactorily answered. Says the Independent: "Every time usury is denounced, the attack is claimed to be on the banks. In view of the many Bible texts against lending on usury, meaning interest, the question naturally arises as to how those who practice it can claim to be religious."

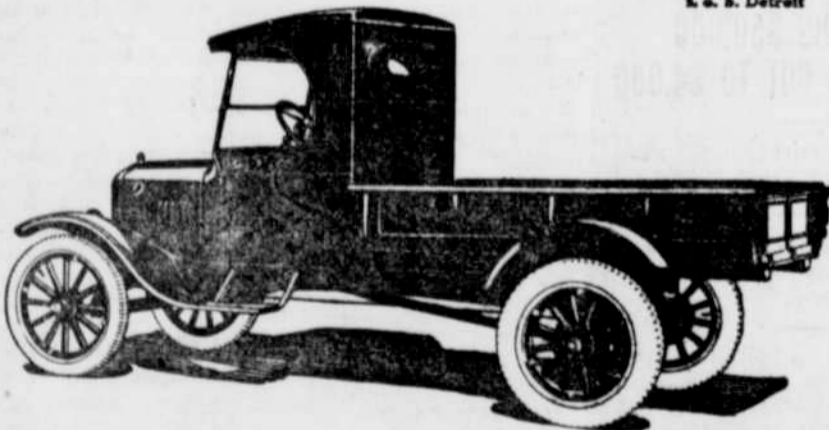
