Raymond Moore, vice president and cashier of the First National Bank of Boise, on Monday began serving a 30-day jail sentence for violation of the liquor law. Upon his entrance the other inmates organized a kangaroo court, the "sheriff" arrested and brought him into the official tribunal of the bastille.

Informed of the nature of the charges against him by "Judge" Charles Glasby, convicted Snake river island moonshiner, Mr. Moore waived rights of trial by jury, which right the constitution of the kangaroo court gives every prisoner, and entered a plea of guilty to the offense of breaking into the Ada county jail without the permission of the inmates.

"Judge" Glasby imposed a fine of \$10 and instructed Mr. Moore as to his duties while in jail. The fine was paid without protest.
