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Law Enforcement Convention.

A "Council of War" in which moral
forces of the Northwest will join to
plans for an intensive campaign against
violation and non-enforcement of the
Prohibition laws has been called by the
Anti Saloon Leagues of Washington,
Idaho and Oregon, for June 3 & 4 in
Portland.

A "Committee of One Thousand" is
being organized to insure the success
of this citizens' law enforcement
congress and several nationally known
speakers have already accepted places
on the program, it is announced. In
addition will be a number of outstand-
ing figures of the Northwest.

In a letter to W. J. Harwig, Super-
intendent of the Oregon Anti Saloon
League, Governor Walter M. Pierce
pledges the Congress his support, de-
claring "something must be done to
arouse the citizens or the enemy of
Prohibition in this territory will be in
control. Dishonest officials and lax law
enforcement today threaten the life of
our civilization, the most perfect that
man has ever developed.

Owyhee Project

The outlook for the early construc-
tion of the Owyhee Project grows
brighter with every move of the offi-
cials having to do with irrigation mat-
ters at Washington. The latest move
was on Wednesday the 17th inst. when
Chairman Smith of the House commit-
tee introduced a bill authorizing an ap-
propriation of \$1,500,000 for the Owy-
hee. Recommendation of other proj-
ects was also made, among them the
Vale project is set down for \$250,000.

Dispense With County Agent

At a conference held in Caldwell
Tuesday between the county com-
missioners and the farmers of the
county it was decided, after a heated
discussion, to make no appropriation
for the county agent's office for the
coming year.

Considerable difference of opinion
was manifested among the farmers as
to the value of the office, some claim-
ing it to be a necessity, while the ma-
jority considered it to be of little use,
their contention being that the farm-
ers' woes were not due to any lack of
ability along production lines but to
price fixing groups of middle men who
bilk the farmer out of his profits.

At the close of preaching service

the Methodist church gathered at the
home of G. H. Cary to tender
a farewell reception to Rev.
L. C. Freeman, who left for a new
field in Oregon. A very delightful

company departed for their homes,
wishing Rev. Freeman God speed and
success in the new field to which he is
