**Wind Jammers
Make Merry Sunday**

The Wind Jammers' convention on Sunday was a success in spite of the extremely bad weather. Cold and windy as it was all the forenoon, at 1 o'clock the streets were lined with cars and the sidewalks covered with people, many of whom had come from neighboring towns for the occasion.

The main attraction, Spies' 100 piece band, formed on Bower avenue at 1:30 and marched up Main street to the band stand on Good avenue, where they discoursed sweet music to the great enjoyment of the assembled crowd. Many compliments were heard among the spectators on the remarkable proficiency displayed by the boys during the comparatively short time they have been under Prof. Spies' instruction. The quality of music dispensed was certainly very creditable to both players and instructor, and all present look forward with pleasurable anticipation to the next offering of this famous musical organization, which we understand will be at no very distant date.

E. M. Blodgett, being called to the platform made a short but forceful talk on Malheur county, past, present and future, voicing the belief that this county is on the threshold of the most successful era of its history, prospects being far brighter now than at any other period of his nearly twenty years' residence here. During this time Nyssa has grown from a one-store-and postoffice town to its present proportions, while much of the surrounding fertile farm land was, at his coming, a bone dry desert. He drew a pleasing picture of what this county will be when the Owyhee project is completed and pointed out the fact that the day when actual construction work will start is not far distant.

The speaker touched upon his recent visit to Portland on behalf of the Commercial Club, in connection with the railroad hearing and pointed out the apparently inconsistent attitudes assumed by the people and the press of Portland. While the business men and people of the metropolis of Oregon were heartily in favor of the line being built, the newspapers, and especially the Oregonian, it was alleged, gave such garbled and unfair reports of the meetings that it is strongly suspected that they must be moved by some ulterior motive.

A. P. Gibson had barely time to pay the band a neat compliment when the wind and dust made outdoor speaking impossible. During the rest of the afternoon the band played popular airs in the council room, where a large crowd had gathered. Refreshment stands of various kinds were liberally patronized, the proceeds being more than sufficient to pay all expenses. Despite the unfavorable weather, a good game of baseball was played by pick-up teams representing Vale and Nyssa, the home team winning by a score of 8 to 5.

Good Work

R. J. Davis is getting in some good licks in the interest of the Owyhee project. When E. C. Van Petten arrived in Washington he was pleasantly surprised to find that a letter of introduction from Mr. Davis to J. Bascom Slomp, President Coolidge's private secretary, had preceded him. Mr. Slomp's father and Mr. Davis's father served together in the Virginia legislature for many years and the professor's letter naturally made it easy for Mr. Van Petten to secure recognition from the higher ups.

Old time acquaintance in the South also enabled Mr. Davis to bring the Owyhee to the personal notice of Senator Swanson of Virginia and Senator McReynolds of Tennessee, with both of whom he is in communication.

In a letter just received Mr. Van Petten pays warm tribute to the value of Mr. Davis' efforts, stating that they have been of great value to the delegation now at Washington.
