TRY AGAIN.

In another column of this issue a correspondent calls in question our statement that there is no Scriptural warrant for the observance of Sunday as the Sabbath and attempts to justify its observance. The most noticeable thing about the article is its great dearth of Scriptural references to support his contentions. In fact, there are none. The only quotation given in regard to the Sabbath pertained exclusively to the seventh day Sabbath. To make it applicable to Sunday, it would first be necessary to show by Scriptural authority that the day of worship has been changed from the seventh day to the first day. This he failed even to attempt to do. This is always the weak link in any argument to justify the Sunday Sabbath—it can't be done. His claim that the observance of any one day in seven fulfills the commandment is of course merely an unfounded assumption, the claim being necessary in order to give even a semblance of justification for arbitrarily making the change from the seventh to the first day.

Nor are we quite ready to concede that one day in seven must necessarily be kept holy. "One man esteemeth one day above another; another man esteemeth every day alike," etc. Rom. 14:5. There is apparently a little conflict here with the command to observe the Sabbath, but Paul is credited with having written under divine inspiration, hence we have to assume that his statements are authoritative.

As we stated last week, the custom of observing Sunday as the Sabbath is the result of evolution, having its origin in two sources—the pagan sun worshipers observing it as their day of worship and the early Christians meeting on that day to commemorate the resurrection

of Christ. There is no Scriptural authority for its observance as the Sabbath.

Two federal judges have decided that President Coolidge had no legal right to grant a pardon to a violator of the Volstead law, who had been sentenced to serve a year in the penitentiary, and the gentleman will have to serve out his sentence. To the ordinary individual it is difficult to understand why President Coolidge should wish to pardon the convicted man, who was a notorious Chicago saloonkeeper. That famous New England conscience must not have been in good working order at the time. Probably the carburetor failed to spark, or something. We have noted several times during the senatorial investigations that the aforesaid conscience was missing beats, and we would advise that it be taken apart by an expert and put in thorough working order before the fall campaign starts.

The attempt to discredit Senator Wheeler should prove a costly boomerang to those guilty of the frame up. It was a disgraceful affair. The Montana senator has been completely exonerated by the investigating committee, headed by Senator Borah, only one member dissenting.

Editor Journal:

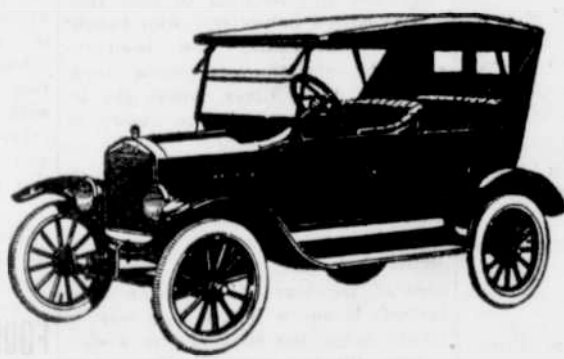
