Pageant at Union

Union, Ore., (Special to the Journal)—A pageant, with a theme utterly new to such Northwest events, will form the spectacular evening entertainment at the Union stock show June 5-6-7. Introduction of a pageant to the stock show program is a new feature of this year and is expected to attract hundreds of additional visitors to the stock show grounds.

"Friends of Mankind," the pageant which Union and surrounding communities are presenting, is an eight episode event, which traces the place that animals have taken in the development of history. It goes back even before the time of man and shows Aurora and her nymphs being chased across the sky by Apollo and his white horses.

Then, starting at the time of Adam and Eve, it follows the place the dumb beast has taken in the development of history, up to the time of the '24 Stock Show.

Nearly 200 characters have been cast in "Friends of Mankind." Elaborate costumes are being made for them. Several carefully directed musical numbers, some by choruses of more than 50, will be included in each of the eight episodes, while dances will form interludes between the episodes.

Nyssa Gets Registration Office

Albert Cook has been appointed registrar at Nyssa for non-resident cars and thus Nyssa is placed upon the tourist map. Albany College to Have \$600,000 New Endowment

A campaign is in progress throughout the entire state of Oregon to raise \$600,000 for Albany self-help college, located at Albany, Ore., one of the oldest schools in this state. To show their interest and belief in the college, the people of Albany and vicinity have already pledged more than \$100,000 of the sum.

While a state-wide organization is being perfected, there has been great progress in the city of Portland proper, where \$350,000 of the entire sum is to be subscribed. Headquarters for the state campaign are in the Multnomah hotel, Portland, with J. Henry Lang in charge as director. F. I. Fuller, first vice-president of the Portland Railway, Light & Power company, is general chairman. All of the Presbyterian churches in the city have been enthusiastically enlisted in the campaign and many men and women of no special church affiliation likewise have been interested. These are people who believe in Christian education and the value of the smaller college as a supplemental agency for the state institutions of higher learning.

Cash Prizes in Albany College Campaign

Through the instrumentality of the Woman's Albany college league, ten prizes, ranging from \$100 cash or a scholarship in Albany college to a number of \$5 cash prizes will be awarded for the ten best essays on Albany student self-help college, located at Albany, Ore., and for which a campaign to raise \$600,000 is now in process throughout the state. Prizes are \$100, \$75, \$50, \$25, \$20, \$10 and four of \$5 each. Any high school student in Oregon is eligible to enter. State headquarters are in the Multnomah hotel, Portland, with J. Henry Lang in charge as director.

NEW MODERN BUILDINGS FOR ALBANY COLLEGE

Rapid Progress Being Made Through-out the State in Campaign to Raise Funds for Expansion Purposes.

Albany student self-help college, located at Albany, Ore., is to have at least three modern new buildings in which to house its many departments of education, when the campaign now on throughout the state is finished and \$600,000 is raised for expansion purposes. Rapid progress is being made in organization work, according to J. Henry Lang, director, at headquarters in the Multnomah hotel, Portland.

At Albany college, every student entered must earn all or part of their way by some of the various methods of work employed, it being the policy of the school thus to inculcate habits of the students carrying their own load, the college lending them a helping hand while doing it. It is believed by the faculty and trustees that this better fits a student for life work, hence it is made obligatory.

Friends of Christian education are being enlisted in the campaign and the response to the call for service has been splendid. Because of the excellent record of the college and the splendid field of opportunity in the northwest, it is believed that a like response will be forthcoming when funds are asked for to put the school on a thoroughly standardized basis as to buildings and productive endowment. Albany college already has \$212,000 productive endowment, but to enlarge its scope and to provide more self-help facilities, it is necessary to have the additional \$600,000, \$100,000 of which has already been subscribed in Albany and vicinity.

All Oregon to Aid Albany Self-Help College

The entire state of Oregon will be appealed to in a campaign now being organized to raise \$600,000 for new buildings, equipment and productive endowment for Albany student self-help college, Albany, Ore., an old-established school under Presbyterian auspices, but not narrowly sectarian. State headquarters are in the Multnomah hotel, Portland, J. Henry Lang being director.
