Polo Tournament

The third annual Boise Polo Tournament and Horse Show begins Decoration Day at the capital city and will continue until June 10. Three Ninth Corps Area Army teams will enter the tournament and will compete for the Ninth Corps championship. These three teams and the Boise team will compete for the annual Northwest Polo Championship. The Boise Polo club believes that this will be one of the best tournaments ever staged in Boise.

The three army teams entered in the tournament are: Seventh Infantry from Vancouver Barracks, Washington; Tenth Field Artillery from Camp Lewis, Washington, and Thirtieth Infantry from Fort D. A. Russell, Wyoming. The Camp Lewis team, winner of the 1924 Pacific Northwest Championship, and the other army teams entered, will be strong competitors in the coming tournament. All of them have gained more than a local reputation in polo circles.

In May of this year the Boise team entered the tournament held at Vancouver, Wash., and won the Grand Championship. The schedule of games has been arranged so that Boise will play on the opening day, Decoration, on Sunday, June 1, and Sunday, June 8, so that the greatest number of people possible can see the Idaho team in action. The Boise team has also been scheduled to play some games during the week.

So far as reported there have been six canines sent to the happy hunting grounds of dog heaven. A couple of them made the mistake Tuesday of raiding Marshal Reberger's chicken pen, killing a number of fine birds. The members of the family were all away from home and the animals were seen at their work of destruction by Mrs. F. D. Hall, who drove them away and telephoned Mr. Reberger, who caught them in the act of chasing a chicken belonging to Con Klinkenberg, with the result that one dog is dead and the owner of the other paid for the damage done.

The heaviest loser from these nuisances, so far as we have heard, is Holden Clement, who figures that 150 of his young turkeys, besides a number of old birds, have fallen victims to the blood lust of these wandering dogs.

The Journal editor is also a sufferer from the depredations of these animals. It took the dogs just a week to put us out of the poultry business. The last raid was made Saturday, when our little bunch of 32 was reduced to nine, with several of them crippled. We arrived at the scene of slaughter in time to see two red bird dogs making a hasty get away.
