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Victor Marshall Injured

Word has been received of a rather serious accident that befell Victor Marshall, a former Nyssa boy now residing in Mina, Nevada.

It seems that while descending a steep hill a wheel broke off his car, as a result of which the car ran off the bank and overturned several times, finally coming to rest with Victor pinned underneath, unconscious from injuries received during the descent. Upon coming to, he succeeded in extricating himself and began a three mile walk to a main road. Weak from bleeding and suffering from a badly lacerated leg as well as other injuries, he fainted, but recovering in a short time resumed the journey. The main road was finally reached, whereupon he fell unconscious and so remained until a passing autoist happened by, rescued and took him to town for medical treatment.

At last reports the injured man was doing well and expected to be able to be about his usual duties in a short time.

5c Milk

Is milk at 5c a quart too cheap? A gentleman who makes a business of buying cream for the market told us that we couldn't make any money at that price. We told him that milk at 5c a quart was equal to butter fat at 40c a pound and asked him what he was paying for butter fat. He said 29c a pound. Let's do a little "eiphering" and see how we come out.

Suppose a cow that gives 40 pounds of milk per day. If her milk tests 5 per cent (a big average) she produces two pounds of butter fat per day, worth at the price quoted 58c. Allowing 5c a gallon for the separated milk the value of the day's output equals 78c. Forty pounds of milk equal practically 19 quarts, which at 5c per quart is worth 95c. Valuing the butter fat at 40c and allowing 20c for the milk the value of the day's product equals \$1.00, or 5c more than the milk at 5c per quart. As a matter of fact, however, the average dairy cow will not test 5 per cent and the amount of butter fat would be considerably less than the two pounds. At all events milk at 5c a quart is worth more than the butter fat at current prices.

Rabies

According to the Oregon state board of health rabies among dogs has shown an alarming increase in prevalence in southwestern and eastern Oregon during the past year. Rabies is a transmissible disease to all warm blooded animals, including man. The disease is more prevalent in the summer. Rabies is an organism which which passes through the finest filter. The infection is transmitted when a rabid animal bites a susceptible or licks another in such a way that the saliva comes in contact with abrasions in the skin or mucus membranes. The abrasions may be so minute that they are imperceptible. The incubation period, or the time between the infection and the development of the dis-

ease, is from three weeks to many months.

The earliest symptoms in dogs is not, as commonly believed, a tendency to rush furiously and blindly about, biting animals or inanimate objects. Before these symptoms develop, the animal passes through a stage of apparent melancholy in which it tries to and appears restless. As the restlessness increases, the dog begins to suffer from apparent hallucinations, snapping and emitting a characteristic howl. A pet dog while in this condition attempts to lick the hands of its friends. Later it leaves home, travels many miles and returns in a state of exhaustion, which is followed by paralysis and death. In some animals the disease never develops into the furious stage. During the later stage of this disease the flow of saliva from the mouth is abundant and it is highly infectious.
