## Attends Medical Meet

The doctor's primary object in going to Vancouver was to attend the third annual meeting of the Northwest Medical Association, which was held in that city June 26-28. The doctor's brother, F. C. Sarasin, also a physician, was present, along with many other medical men from all parts of the northwest.

While only in its third year, this new association is already a large and flourishing institution, which has for its object the diffusion of the latest medical knowledge among its members by getting together occasionally and discussing new discoveries and their application to the healing art. The geographical isolation of the Pacific coast from the great eastern medical centers makes the new association of peculiar advantage, as it affords an opportunity for western doctors to attend meetings and hear addresses by the greater authorities in the profession, which if held in the east would be inaccessible to them.

The speakers on the program at Vancouver included some of the most noted physicians of the United States, Canada and Great Britain.
