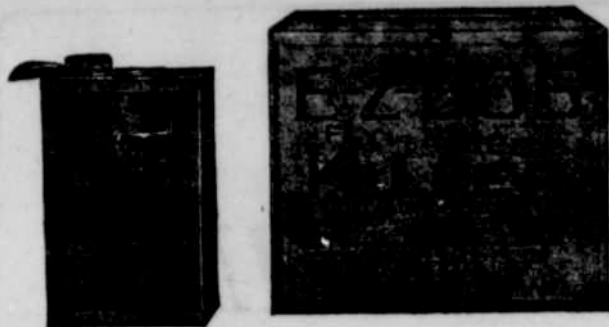

Drainage Work Begins

Construction of the Ward Drainage ditch has started. The big steam shovel which will be used on the job was unloaded Tuesday and taken to the scene of operations. The Morrison-Knudsen Co. of Boise are the contractors. W. H. Puckett, who built the Arcadia Drainage system, will be in charge of the work. The concrete pipe, about a mile of which will be required, is being manufactured by the Ontario Concrete Pipe Co. and delivered on the works by Dick Holmes.

Fine Spuds
