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Council Meets

The city council held its regular monthly meeting Monday night at which a number of business matters were disposed of. C. L. McCoy was appointed as councilman to fill out the unexpired term of C. H. Prettyman. A building permit was issued to Jesse Thompson to erect a structure on the Hoxie corner next the Liberty theater.

The contract for three sidewalk crossings between the Journal office and the school house went to Stanley Fenn at the price of 80c per running foot.

The vacant block adjoining the ball park on the east was purchased by the city for the purpose of making it into a park. The town being a little short of funds at the present time it is hoped some of our civic organizations will come to the front and help raise the necessary funds to put the property in shape to be used for the purpose for which it is intended.

Tuesday evening a special meeting was held, at which 500 feet of fire hose was purchased at a price of \$1.15 per foot. The meeting followed a testing of the hose now owned by the city, at which it was shown that only 200 feet was in good condition. The balance, amounting to about 500 feet, leaked badly.

At this meeting a building permit was granted Eddie Powell to construct a building on the corner of Main and Second streets to be used as a filling station.

New Filling Station

Eddie Powell is building a new service station on the vacant lots east of Dr. Sarazin's office. The building will be of concrete blocks and it is expected to have ready for occupancy in 30 days. George Green has the contract for the work. Eddie will carry a full line of filling station supplies and will serve the needs of the auto public with his usual courtesy, reliability and efficiency.

Enjoy Fishing Trip

(Communicated)

A. V. Cook, J. P. Baxter and their families, Nellie DeVries, Mrs. Lysalis of Ontario, Mr. and Mrs. T. C. Cook and Walter Cook of Keating, Oregon, report a successful fishing trip into the Blue mountains some 80 miles from Baker during the past two weeks.

The party, 16 in number, left the ranch of T. C. Cook Monday morning, August 21, some of the younger people riding the pack horses and others in the automobiles as far as the Raisin mine, where the cars were left and the bedding and provisions were packed on the string of pack horses. While the packs were being put on the horses and when it comes to throwing the diamond hitch, the squaw hitch and many others too numerous to mention, A. V. was right at home. The women and children, lead by Mrs. T. C. Cook, started on the long trail, the pack train to follow later.

The trail was a real sight. Winding our way through deep canyons, around cliffs along precipices, through beautiful forests. There were places on the trail where one mistep by a Mustang would have wrecked the entire train, and they might have rolled thousands of feet below into the deep canyons. But by the careful guidance of Walter Cook, who has had experience in the mountains, the company arrived safe at Cougar camp on Main Eagle about 5 o'clock p. m. Monday evening. Everybody was tired over the six mile hike, but soon tents were pitched and preparations were made for supper.

Each fisherman now put on his favorite fly, hoping to attract the attention of a few speckled beauties for supper. To our enjoyment we soon discovered that we were on one of Oregon's real fishing streams, and we were delighted to see as soon as the fly, when properly cast on the water, the splash of the rainbow. About 30 minutes of real pleasure and we had plenty of fish for supper. After supper the pine boughs were brought for the beds and all were tired enough to enjoy a good night's sleep, out in the great world of nature where the air is pure and the water cold and everything seems to smile at you.

We camped here for ten days and enjoyed ourselves in various ways. We had no trouble getting all the fish we could handle each day. We gathered a large quantity of huckleberries, but the gathering of huckleberries proved to be very burdensome on the part of A. V. and J. P., when fishing was so good.

A. V. and Walter Cook and J. P. Baxter spent one day visiting main Eagle lake. The trail to the lake is a real hard one and the horses experienced some real climbing. The lake is about one and a half miles long by three-quarters of a mile wide and is situated up in the top of the highest peaks. It has the appearance of an old crater and no doubt in the past ages has been a place of eruption and a scene of molten lava belching forth from the bowels of the earth. We caught a few fish in the lake, yet the river fishing was better. We secured some beautiful pictures of the wondrous land.

The day finally came to pack out. The women and children started as soon as breakfast was over and the men packed and lead the horses about two miles from camp. A. V. was leading a Mustang that was not very safe to pack and something happened. The horse became frightened and started to buck. The trail was dusty at this particular point and you couldn't see Art for dust. I called to him and was glad when he answered. The horse threw the packs off to one side and ran between the two horses ahead. We blindfolded him at once and cut the pack off and repacked him. Outside of this we reached the camp safely. The grade was so steep coming back down Baxter's brakes became so hot they would not hold, so to avoid trouble a large tree was tied behind to help steady the car over the steep places. Thursday was spent in and around Baker visiting Mr. Baxter's brother, also A. V.'s relatives and we returned Friday evening, when many of our friends enjoyed a trout supper, as we salted some down and brought them out.

It was a real trip.

Serious Accident

A serious accident occurred to Mrs. M. M. Greeling of Kingman Thursday when her auto ran off the grade just across the Owyhee bridge. Mrs. Greeling, who was alone in the car, was rendered unconscious and the car demolished.

This grade is a dangerous one and much complaint has been made of it in the past. The roadway is too narrow and should at least be substantially fenced. The county court should get busy and have this condition remedied before other accidents occur.

Lowe house close to the hot springs. Mrs. Schweizer is taking frequent advantage of the hot springs for bathing purposes in the hope that the well known medicinal qualities of the water will tend to alleviate some rheumatic pains which have been annoying her of late.
