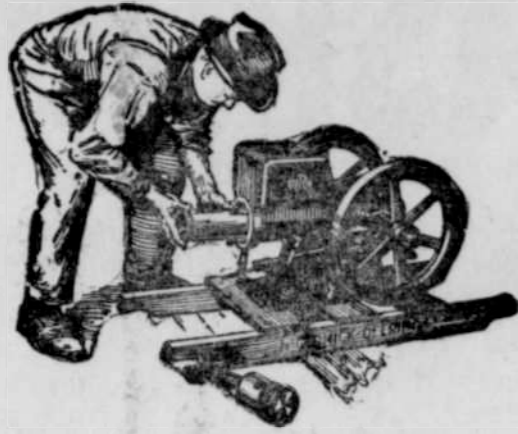

The duties of the Farm Bureau project directors are to see that work in their respective departments is given attention by the Extension Service and the County Farm Bureau and to generally represent the farm Bureau in their departments, cooperating with and advising with the Extension Service and the Farm Bureau executive committee.

County Library

Shows Rapid Growth

Annual report just completed by the librarian shows that with the addition of 1254 volumes during the year the total available book collection at the close of 1924 was 3062 volumes. This compared with the population of the county shows we are rapidly approaching the goal set by the librarian—"A book for every person."

At the close of the year there were 2318 active borrowers of this number 1018 registered during 1924.

The total circulation of 46,275 volumes shows a gain of \$100 volumes over 1923, or a 12.4 per cent gain. In the terms of the business man it shows a complete stock turnover 5.7 times, while in the terms of the American Library association it shows a per capita circulation of 4.6 books.
During the year five new stations were started in remote sections of the

Notice is hereby given to all persons interested in the land included within the Owyhee Drainage District, Malheur county, Oregon, the boundary lines of said district being as follows, to wit:
