### Plan New Road to Cemetery

At the regular meeting of the commercial club held on Wednesday, the 18th inst., the matter of the road to the cemetery was brought before the members, as one which called for the attention of the club. It was pointed out that during the winter which has just passed travel over the road from town to the cemetery, located about one and a half miles west of town on the top of the hill, was almost impassable, resulting in great inconvenience and bitter disappointment to many of the people in this town and vicinity who were called by the shadow of death having visited their homes or that of their relatives or friends to make the sad and weary trip to the little graveyard "Out West." After much discussion and consideration of the subject, it was agreed by the members present that the same was a worthy one, deserving of the attention of the club, and a committee of four, consisting of Messrs. C. E. Hunt, S. B. Geshert, Troy Siltou and Frank Miller, was appointed to prepare and circulate petitions having for their object the raising of funds to be used in the construction of a new road from the town to the cemetery on an easy grade, passable at all seasons of the year; or, failing in this, the regrading and working over of the present road, so that it may likewise be suitable for travel, no matter how deep the snow or how soft the earth.

It is the desire of the club that all persons take note of this matter and that when the petitions are presented to them for consideration that they may be ready to give as they have decided they can afford to do. Anyone not solicited and wishing to help can mail check for the amount they wish to give to either of the committeemen named above.
