### Encouraging Outlook for Owyhee Project

R. J. Davis, one of the directors of the Owyhee Irrigation District, has been flooding congress lately with appeals for aid for the High Line. Among other replies received is the following from Congressman Addison T. Smith of Idaho, chairman of the committee on Irrigation and Reclamation:

Washington, D. C., Feb. 19, 1925.  
Mr. R. J. Davis,  
Nyssa, Oregon.

Dear Mr. Davis: Acknowledging yours of the 13th I beg to say that the bill making appropriations for the Interior Department, which contains the Senate amendment of the Owyhee irrigation project, is still in conference. I am informally advised that the House conferees have accepted the amendment and that it will be part of the law when finally enacted. It contains the remainder of the appropriation for this project to be expended during the fiscal year, 1925, which will carry the matter along until July 1, 1927.

All of which means that the appropriation of \$315,000 made at the close of the last session of congress and made available only until July 1925, will by amendment, in all probability, be made available until July 1, 1927, which will insure its use in the construction of the Owyhee project.

### County P. T. A. Notes

Saturday afternoon, February 14, a meeting of the executive board of the county council was held in the county library. Members of the council were present from Vale, Big Bend, Owyhee, Brogan, Kingman Colony and Ontario. The county president, Mrs. M. M. Gresham, opened the meeting by describing the plan of organization under which the P. T. A. works and showing how the work of each circle fits into the general scheme. The keynote of this plan, she explained, is co-operation. Each circle, no matter how small, does its part and thus is perfected a chain, the strong links of which are the county, state and national organizations. As the main purpose of the meeting was to plan for the spring county council to be held at Big Bend in April, the committee discussed the program and proposed business of that meeting. It was voted to recommend that the council add to its list of officers a corresponding secretary, and that an expense fund be created to take care of the necessary expense incurred in the transaction of business. The president appointed the following nominating committee: Mrs. May Roberts, Ontario; Mrs. Boswell, Vale; Mrs. Ott, Valley View.
