## High Line

The fight made by our congressional delegation to have the date for the expenditure of \$315,000 recently appropriated for the Owyhee project extended from July 1, 1925, the date originally set, to July 1, 1927, has been successful. This means that if the reclamation really intends to go ahead with this project they now have the opportunity to make a start. Once started the work would undoubtedly be carried to completion.

## Dining Room to Open
