New Road Supervisor

Relief for Taxpayers

In a letter to the Journal County Clerk Sackett states that the county court has ordered the tax collector to receive taxes in accordance with this law. As the Lord only helps those who help themselves, it's up to us delinquent taxpayers to get busy and pay up before May 1.
