Oakes, at Ontario, Oregon, until 2:00 o'clock p. m. of the 22nd day of April, 1925, and thereafter publicly opened, for the purchase of the negotiable coupon bonds of said District in the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5000.00) par value, dated January 1st, 1925, to mature serially over a period commencing January 1st, 1930, and ending January 1st, 1944, said bonds to bear interest at the rate of six per cent per annum, payable semi-annually upon the first days of July and January.

Marketing and Progress Will Feature Dinner

Grange Hall at Cairo to Be Scene of Countywide Gathering—Underwritten by Commercial Clubs and Farm Bureau.

A unique feature in the county's economic and social life will be staged next week in the form of a "County Progress Dinner" to feature farm marketing, reclamation, dairying and general farm and county development. Grange Hall at Cairo will be the scene of this event, and Wednesday evening, March 25, at 6:45, the time.

The Malheur County Farm Bureau, the Ontario Commercial Club, the Vale Commercial Club and the Nyssa Commercial Club are jointly underwriting the affair in the amount of 100 tickets at 90c each, and the County Agricultural Agent and Club Leader are making the local arrangements.

R. H. Kipp, manager of the marketing department of the Portland Chamber of Commerce, will deliver an address on marketing farm products. This project is receiving much attention from the Portland chamber at this time as a state and Northwest development proposition under Mr. Kipp's leadership.

A prominent dairy specialist from the Oregon Agricultural College is expected to participate in the program. Short talks on the reclamation situation, which is of great current interest at the present time, and on other general and county development subjects will round out the program.
