Oakes, at Ontario, Oregon, until 2:00 o'clock p. m. of the 22nd day of April, 1925, and thereafter publicly opened, for the purchase of the negotiable coupon bonds of said District in the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5000.00) par value, dated January 1st, 1925, to mature serially over a period commencing January 1st, 1930, and ending January 1st, 1944, said bonds to bear interest at the rate of six per cent per annum, payable semi-annually upon the first days of July and January.

### Installing Meters

City Marshal Cook is installing water meters on a number of the larger users, the purpose being to enable the council to adjust the water rates upon a more equitable basis than prevails at present. They wish to ascertain if the heavier users are paying as high a rate for their water as the ordinary householder. The city owns about 60 water meters, sufficient to check up on all those places where there is any question of the amount of water used being paid for. These meters can be installed by the marshal at a trifling cost and will no doubt result in a considerable increase in the receipts from the water system.

As a matter of fact, our water rates are far too low and should be increased all along the line about 50 per cent. This would put the system on a self-sustaining basis and permit of replacement when the present system is worn out.
