Offices Consolidated Improve Low Pressure

The announcement reached here Thursday morning, says the Malheur Enterprise, of the consolidation of the Burns with the Vale land office, along with the abolishment of more than a score of land offices throughout the United States. At the same time it was announced that the office at La Grande would be abolished, the work being consolidated with the central Oregon headquarters at The Dalles. This procedure leaves only five land offices in the state of Oregon, only four of which will be actively engaged in the unsettled land business. These are Lakeview, Roseburg, The Dalles and Vale. Portland will have the fifth office, the location there being held open to finish up the work of the field and special agents.

Under the new system the Vale office will handle two or three times the volume of work in the past, but it will be mostly by way of correspondence, since the territory will be of such an area that it will be impossible for homesteaders to make the trip in some cases. United States commissioners in different localities will handle the taking of final proofs, etc.

Turns Gardener

Work being a little slack in the carpentering line this spring, P. M. Binkley turned his attention to the growing of vegetables on his property in the north part of town. Results so far are most encouraging. Onions are already big enough to use, with peas, radishes and lettuce coming on apace. A large patch of strawberries and raspberries also give good promise of richly rewarding the husbandman's efforts later in the season. Altogether it looks as though P. M. is going to put a big crimp in the high cost of living this summer.

About \$180 in cash was abstracted from the safe, which was either opened by the thieves, or inadvertently left open the previous evening by the manager. The visitors also helped themselves freely to knives, razors and other merchandise.

The robbery not being discovered till morning, the thieves had a good chance to get away. The sheriff's staff has the matter in hand, but so far as we can learn no clues have yet been found which would be likely to lead to the capture of the miscreants.

Wolf \$25, Cougar \$25, Wild Cat \$25.

The above bounties are in addition to those paid by the various counties. Hides must be presented to the county clerk of the county in which the animal was killed and affidavit of such killing be made and forwarded to the State Game commission. All wolf hides must be forwarded to the State Game commission for identification.
