## Experts Will Discuss Problems of Dairymen

N. C. Jamieson, dairy specialist of the Oregon Agricultural College will talk on general dairy problems, such as selecting, judging, feeding, and management of the dairy herd, at a series of meetings to be held next week.

W. B. Wagner, manager of the Payette Cooperative Creamery, will demonstrate the method of handling, testing and grading cream, from the cow to the consumer. Mr. Wagner says: "We are always glad to cooperate with the Extension Service in any way we can to help the dairymen to improve the quality of their cream. High quality cream means high quality butter."

Mr. McKee, the tester for the Weiser-Payette cow testing association, will talk on the advantages of a cow testing association. He will also test some samples of whole milk and cream for the dairymen at each meeting. This will give the dairymen an opportunity to check up on their separator to see if it is getting all the cream from the milk and to learn the proper method of testing milk and cream.
