Mrs. Kinzie A. Corbin died in Payette, Idaho, Wednesday night, May 6, after a brief illness. Death was due to heart trouble. Her death came as a shock to her relatives and friends here, as her condition was reported improving and she expected to be able to return home in a few days.

Funeral services were held today at 10 a. m. at the Nazarene church in Ontario and the body laid to rest in the West Side cemetery.
