Rights Adjudicated

(Malheur Enterprise)

On April 26, Rhea Luper, state engineer, filed in the circuit court of Malheur county, an order in the Owyhee river water adjudication. There are 217 water rights involved, with 29,000 acres of irrigable land represented.

The order provides that the water shall not exceed three acre feet an acre feet during the irrigation season, April 1 to October 15. Another limitation is that not more than one acre foot of water shall be used on any single acre of land during any one month prior to June 1, and not more than three-fourths of an acre during any calendar month after June 1.

The Owyhee river adjudication is important in that it has a bearing on one of the three large federal irrigation projects included in the reclamation program announced at the last session of congress. The projects include the Owyhee, Vale and Baker irrigation districts.
