**Fruitgrowers Beware**

The past ten days there has been more or less weather favorable to the emergence of codling moths and egg laying of this pest. It is possible that worms may be hatched the last of the present week or the first of next, although their number may not be large.

Where the calyx spray or "double calyx" spray has been just recently applied, the apples may be sufficiently covered to protect them for a little while. It must be remembered, however, that the surface of small apples increases very rapidly.

Continuance of warm weather will no doubt bring a repetition of last year's conditions making the dating of sprays more difficult than in seasons when temperatures favorable to egg laying do not occur until some time in June.

The first principle, of course, in codling moth control is to always have poison on ahead of the worms, dating the sprays to catch "broods" as far as possible as they emerge. If there is more or less continuous emergence through the season, the only safe procedure is to spray often enough to keep the apples covered.

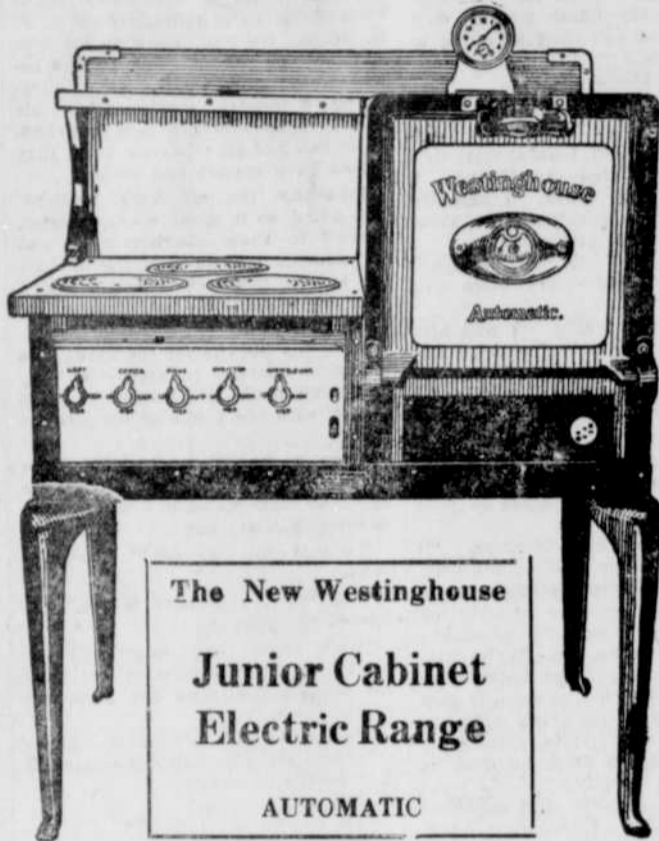
**No "Walking Stick" Snake**
