## Airplane Spraying Demonstration Success

A crowd conservatively estimated at 2000 people gathered at the Pipeline farm of the E. O. Land Co. a few miles southwest of Nyssa Monday afternoon to witness the demonstration of spraying for alfalfa weevil by airplane. The crowd included representatives of all sections from Boise to Weiser and as far west as Crane.

The demonstration Monday was only partially successful, owing to the prevalence of wind and the carefulness of operation necessary to prevent danger to the crowds scattered around. One hundred acres were dusted Monday. Tuesday's operation on the same field was entirely successful, some 300 acres being thoroughly dusted. The following day the machine was taken to Jamieson and treated 200 acres more for the same company.

The machine flies at a distance of 50 feet above the ground and covers a strip 150 feet wide each trip. The material used is kalsomine arsenate dust, with dinitomacous earth, mined and milled at Harper, used in equal parts in bulk. The cost is 1c per acre for the filler, 25c for arsenate and 30c for the airplane. Two pounds kalsomine and two pounds filler sprays one acre. The plane belongs to Lieut. Defoeri, a world war veteran.

Spraying for alfalfa weevil by airplane is rather an innovation in this section and if the result proves as satisfactory as the first tests indicate it is liable to work a hardship on Friend Bug.
