## Third Crop Improvement Field Day Announced

Farm Tour and Picnic to View Crop Demonstrations and Improved Fields—To Start 10 A. M. Wednesday Near Nyssa—Barbecued Steer on Menu.

Back in 1921 many Malheur county farmers will remember the big crop improvement tour which started at Cairo, went south to Big Bend for lunch and program and then journeyed over into Idaho to see the sights. And again the crop improvement was featured in 1923 by a field day and picnic at the Mallett farm at which a wheat nursery of about 50 varieties was the center of attraction for farmers. Now comes the announcement from the office of the county agent of the third crop improvement field day, tour and picnic to be held next Wednesday, July 15.

The Gerritt Groot farm just one mile west of Nyssa has been picked as the assembly place. Beginning promptly at 10 a. m. a tour of demonstration plans to view field pea varieties on trial, fertilized red clover, wheat improvement tests and other demonstrations and improved fields will take place. A basket lunch at noon, supplemented by barbecued beef prepared by a group of Vale farmers, lemonade and coffee furnished by the Farm Bureau, and ice cream served by the Farmers Cooperative Creamery, promises to be a big feature of the day.

At 2 p. m. a short program on crop improvement subjects will be heard. Brief reports by crop improvement committeemen on various trials and demonstrations in progress, a corn seed testing demonstration by one of the boys' clubs and an address by E. R. Jackman of the O. A. C. Extension service on "The Irrigated Pasture" are among the program items.

All citizens of the county are invited to attend this field day to witness and hear the progress made and to be made in better farm crops.

## Reclamation Meeting

A most enthusiastic reclamation meeting was held at Ontario this (Friday) morning and the Vale and Owyhee projects thoroughly discussed with government officials, Secretary Work, Ellwood Mead, Gov. Pierce, Senators McNary and Stanfield and Representative Sinnott were present.

A lengthy report of conditions under the Owyhee project was read and produced a distinctly favorable impression among the officials. Representatives of the Eastern Oregon Land Co. and the Western Colonization Co. were present and agreed that their respective companies would colonize their lands in the project and guarantee the payments. As the holdings of these two companies comprise a good percentage of the total area this was a strong factor in causing the officials to look with favor upon the project. The meeting was concluded without a hitch and the consensus of opinion is that the cause of the Owyhee reclamation project was materially advanced. Among those who attended from here were R. J. Davis, Dr. J. J. Sarasin, Chas. Thompson and S. D. Goshert.

The E. S. Kensington was held Wednesday p. m. with M. J. A. Boydell, assisted by her daughter, Mrs. Sarasin. A goodly number was present. The afternoon was spent in visiting, after which delicious refreshments were served. Mrs. C. F. Edor of New Plymouth was among those present. Mrs. G. F.
