## Crop Improvement Field Day Meet

The Gerritt Groot farm west of Nyssa was the scene of a very interesting and profitable crop improvement field day on Wednesday of this week. At 10 o'clock a lengthy procession of autos left the Groot farm to inspect a number of experiments in crop improvement, including field peas, fertilized red clover and wheat improvement tests. A basket lunch at noon, supplemented by barbecued beef prepared by a group of Vale farmers, lemonade and coffee furnished by the Farm Bureau and ice cream furnished by the Farmers Cooperative Creamery, was a big feature of the day. About two hundred people, representative farmers and their wives, partook of the dinner.

At 2 p. m. a short program on crop improvement was given. E. R. Jackman, of the O. A. C. Extension Service, was the principal speaker and gave an address on "The Irrigated Pasture" that contained many valuable hints to farmers. There were a number of reports by committeemen on various trials and demonstrations now in progress.

## Potatoes Sold

The potato market is opening up fairly strong and prospects look good for a profitable crop. Harry Yost, a well known buyer of Boise, has been contracting with local growers this week at \$2.00 per cwt., f. o. b. Nyssa. About 30 cars have been contracted at this figure. This price allows the grower a good margin of profit and many will take advantage of it. The apple and grain crops also look most encouraging, both as to yield and price. A price of \$1.25 per basket has been offered for one lot of apples with one of the best crops on the trees that the country has ever produced. All in all, it looks as though the Nyssa country was in for a period of unprecedented prosperity.
