A. G. Kingman Passes

The funeral services for Mr. A. G. Kingman, who died at his home in Kingman Kelony early Sunday morning, were held in the Kolony school house on Wednesday morning at 10 o'clock. The services were conducted by the Rev. Snow from Payette. Mrs. C. E. Peck of Big Bend, Mr. and Mrs. Joe Bruning and the Misses Lydia and Maudine Johnson assisted with the music. The services were attended by a very large number of people, both from his own and neighboring communities, and there were many lovely floral offerings.

Mr. Kingman was the founder of the section known as Kingman Kolony and the first settler on that side of the Owyhee river. He reserved for himself, by homesteading, about 120 acres of land lying along Snake river, where he has since lived. Mr. Kingman was largely responsible for securing both settlers and irrigation for the Kolony and was one of the best known and respected men in this part of the country.

He was born near Fremont, Illinois, June 17, 1847, and lived there the greater part of the time before coming to Oregon. He was married in 1884 to Miss Lizzie M. Kipp, and they had two daughters, Lizzie Kipp Kingman died in 1898, and Mr. Kingman married again in 1905 to Miss Nellie Kipp, who survives him. His daughters are Mrs. Harvey Otis of Adrian, Oregon, and Mrs. A. E. Wade of Lewiston, Idaho. There are eight grandchildren.
