Qualified as Marksmen

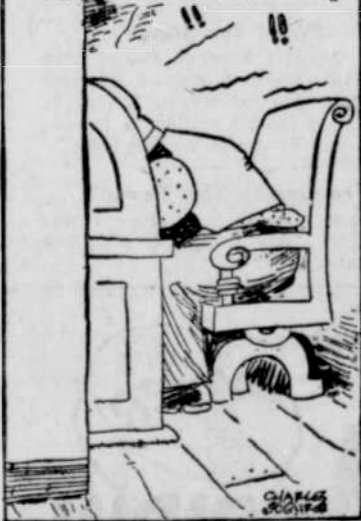
Seventy eight per cent of the student soldiers in attendance at the Citizens Military Training camp at Camp Lewis June 19 to July 18 who fired the record course in rifle marksmanship qualified either as sharpshooters or as marksmen, according to figures that have been completed at headquarters. The number completing the course is 466, of which 20 qualified as sharpshooters and 336 as marksmen. Included among those who qualified on the rifle range are George M. Newby and Earl R. Richardson of Nyssa.
