## Thrilling Programs to Feature at Fair

Racing Strings Already on  
Ground Preparing for the Race  
Meet—Interest Is Spreading  
Over Wide Area—Committees  
at Work.

Ontario, Oregon, August 26—Thrilling daily programs before the grand stand, speed races on the track and spectacular events within the arena will give the patrons of the 16th Annual Malheur County Fair and Race meet action on their money on each and every day of the Fair, September 8, 9 and 10.

Already there are strings of horses working out on the track, and W. H. Doolittle has received entry blanks from owners with 23 head and inquiries for many more, beside the long list coming from Caldwell. All told, the stalls at the fair ground will be taxed to capacity, for between 75 and 100 horses will be in Ontario for the meet. They are coming from as far north as La Grande and Elgin in Oregon, and Meadows in Idaho; as far west as John Day Valley and as far south as Jordan Valley in Oregon and the Boise valley in Idaho.

### \$1000 for two Daily Acts

To furnish a real big thrill every day of the Fair, the committee has secured Mat Gay, the famous stunt diver, who, though 65 years of age, daily climbs a 100 foot pole and makes a back somersault dive into a tank of water only 100 feet long and ten feet deep. This breath taking dangerous stunt will be seen only at the fair ground, and as a companion piece there will be shown each day the aerial acrobatics of the Ray family in their original production.

### Thursday Idaho Day

The closing day of the Fair has been designated as Idaho day. Beside some special stunts for the benefit of Idahoans, there will be present the Caldwell band and a big delegation of Caldwell folk.

### Exhibits to be Exceptional

Secretary Ivan E. Oakes of the Fair board, is receiving inquiries for space in the exposition hall and is confident that the exhibits will surpass any in recent years. Interest in the competition is keener because of the reclassification of the premiums so that staple crops are better rewarded, the purpose being to encourage the production of those crops which will annually return profits to the growers.

There will also be a spirited competition among the boys' and girls' clubs of the county, says I. M. C. Anderson, assistant county agent, who has a larger number of club members working on projects this year than ever before.

Aside from the entertainment at the Fair grounds, there will be an exceptional amusement program furnished every night by the Snap Brothers' Carnival, with its many new rides and features. Of course there will be dancing and music and all the spirit of Caenival week which makes joy replace gloom and makes life worth living. The entire program is designed to fittingly mark the return of prosperity to this region.
