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THE BIBLE AS A GUIDE

A prominent local churchman said recently that while we cannot understand all the Bible we can understand enough to live right.

But can we?

Some of the most horrible crimes of history have been committed by professed Christians, with the Bible before them as a guide. Like Saul of Tarsus, they verily thought they were doing God a service. Yet they committed deeds that would cause the orthodox devil to be jealous of his laurels.

Is it right for people to go to war and kill their brethren?

A fair interpretation of the Bible would absolutely prohibit it. Yet we find Christians, with few exceptions, enrolling in the army as readily as non-believers.

Is it right to own slaves?

It was thought to be for ages, and the Bible was cited as authority.

Is it right to persecute those who differ with you religiously?

It has been done times without number, even unto death, by people who drew their inspiration from the Bible.

Is it right to kill witches?

Christians indulged in this pastime quite extensively at one time, although it has gone out of vogue now. But they were merely following out God's command to Moses to "let not a witch remain a live."

Is it right to drink intoxicating liquor?

The Bible is a little confusing on this question, but even clergy men indulged in the practice until comparatively recent times.

Is it right to use tobacco?

The Bible is silent on this question, and each Christian settles it according to his own desires.

Is it right for divorced persons to remarry?

Christ was plain on this point, but there is a tendency among Christians to disregard his restrictions.

Is it right to loan money for

interest?

The Bible puts usurers in the same class with murders, thieves and whoremongers.

is what is known as "birth control" right? There is considerable controversy over the question at the present time. What does the Bible say about it?

Is it right for religionists to go to civil law and civil courts to force their neighbors to conform to their particular religious belief? They are trying to do it, and with a measure of success.

There is scarcely a question affecting our every day life (except possibly going to church) upon which there is any unanimity of opinion among Christians as to what is right, and the fact that there are around 200 Protestant denominations shows they are no closer together on matters of theology.

EXPLANATION NEEDED

In a publication by the Adventist denomination we note the claim that the darkening of the sun in 1780 and the falling of the stars in 1833 were signs in fulfillment of the prophecy regarding the end of the world. This claim is not supported by a preponderance of scriptural testimony. What does the Bible say?

The sun shall be turned into darkness, and the moon into blood, before the great and terrible day of the Lord come.—Joel 2:30-31.

That passage could reasonably be taken in support of the claim. There are other references, however, that refute it. Luke 21:27, after a recital of these same signs and wonders, says:

And THEN shall they see the Son of Man coming in a cloud with power and great glory.

"Then," in this case would mean that the end of the world would immediately follow the darkening of the sun and the falling of the stars. Did it? It has been 145 years since the sun was darkened and 92 years since the stars fell.

But there is other testimony still more damaging. Both Matthew and Mark state that immediately AFTER the tribulations preceding the end of the world these signs shall take place.

But in those days, AFTER that tribulation, the sun shall be darkened and the moon shall not give her light, and the stars of heaven shall fall, and the powers that are in heaven

shall be shaken.—Luke 23:24-25

IMMEDIATELY after the tribulation of those days shall the sun be darkened, and the moon shall not give her light, and the stars shall fall from heaven, and the powers of heaven shall be shaken.—Matthew 24:29.

How can an event that has already passed be claimed as a sign that is to follow something that has not yet happened? We will await the answer with considerable interest.

We fear our adventist friends, in their zeal to seize on some thing that could be construed as a fulfillment of prophecy, have let themselves fall into grievous error.

TIMELY WARNING

In a recent speech Charles Evans Hughes sounds a timely note of warning against the present tendency to encroach upon liberty of learning.

"The most ominous sign of our times," Hughes declared, "is the indication of growth of an intolerant spirit which is most dangerous when armed, as it usually is, with sincere conviction. It can be exorcised only by the genius which watched over our infancy and has guarded our development the American spirit of civil and religious liberty."

Above all else Hughes emphasized his fear for the freedom of education and his insistence that this freedom be protected. He said the question had nothing to do with the soundness of the theory of evolution. But he unhesitatingly denounced any endeavor to regulate what shall be taught in the schools by religious standards.

"What could be a nobler exercise of governmental power than to destroy religious error and save the souls of men from perdition?" he asked, and then gave his own answer:

"That plausible pretext has given us the saddest pages of history. That is the road that leads back to the perversion of authority and the abhorrent practices of the dark days of political disqualifications on grounds of religion, of persecution, of religious wars, of tortures, of martyrdom."

The Journal has for some time considered the Church a menace to our American form of government through its endeavor to break down the barrier between church and state and its disregard of the constitution when said constitution stands in the way of desired religious legislation. We have been doing our little bit to arouse the people to a realization of this danger. The fact that such an eminent statesman as Mr. Hughes also recognizes the peril give us courage to gird up our loins and continue the good fight.

We learn from press dispatches that President Coolidge "has let it be known" that he disapproves of giving publicity to income tax returns and will recommend that the publicity feature be repealed. Well! Well! That's interesting if true, and just as interesting if it isn't true. The Journal will "let it be known" that it thoroughly approves of the publicity feature so that makes it a standoff. We would be glad if Mr. Coolidge or some of his apologists would explain the principle that makes it all right to give publicity to property tax but not to income tax.
