### Road Nearly Completed

Contractor J. W. Robertson and his  
grading crew have nearly completed  
the new road to the cemetery, and  
after looking over the work Mr. Rob-  
ertson pronounces "very good." By  
exercising a little judgment in select-  
ing the route a much better grade was  
secured than was at first thought pos-  
sible and the roadbed is protected from  
being washed out by heavy rains or  
melting snows. The cost of the road  
is \$150, which was raised by popular  
subscription.

There yet remains a little work,  
however, that should be done this side  
of the Shoerthing ditch. The road is  
low at this point and should be graded  
up to keep the water out of the road,  
and there is also a small hillock that  
should be cut down to make the grade  
more uniform. It is estimated that  
it would require a grading crew not to  
exceed two days to do this work and  
about half of the necessary teams  
and men have been offered free. Those  
having the matter in charge should  
endeavor to complete this work, even  
if it is necessary to raise a little more  
cash.
