New Well a Success

According to Mayor P. M. Warren Nyssa is now the fortunate owner of a real water system, the best in the history of the town. The new well is proving to be an unqualified success and is furnishing an abundance of pure cold water. With the present pumping facilities the plant lifts a little over 200 gallons a minute, and requires only about two hours pumping out of the 24 to supply the needs of the town. This will cut down the power bill materially and effect a saving that will soon pay for the new well. The mayor is justly proud of the improvements that have been made to the system and invites the citizenry to call as the plant and inspect the work.

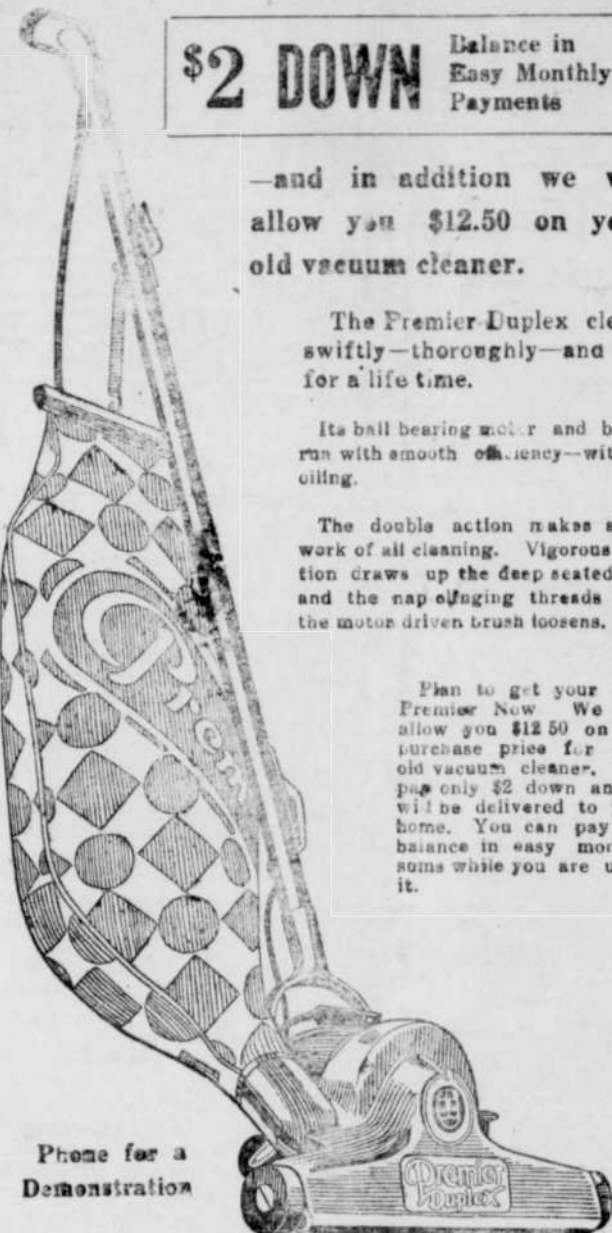
