A Fatal Wound

On Tuesday morning, December 22,
1925, E. M. Plodgett, district attor-
ney, was notified of the death of Jos-
eph Tipton of Cord, Oregon, resulting
from a gunshot wound in the head.
Coroner O. E. Payne was notified and
the coroner, district attorney, sheriff
and Annette Blodgett went to the
scene of the shooting to hold an in-
quest over the body, arriving at 10
o'clock that evening. A coroner's
jury was speedily secured and the evi-
dence taken, the jury returning a
verdict that the deceased came to his
death from a gunshot wound from a
gun held in the hands of the deceased,
and that no blame was attached to
any other person.

The evidence disclosed that the
other members of the family were
eating breakfast, and that Mr. Tipton,
without sitting down to the table,
walked out of the room, stepped off
the porch and shot himself. The
shooting occurred on the morning of
the 17th and the deceased lived until
the morning of the 22nd, when he
died, not having regained conscious-
ness after the shooting.

A Fine Show

direction from the directors as not a
teacher was visible after the play
started. The entertainment was a
credit to both teachers and pupils.
Music for the occasion was furnished
by the high school orchestra.

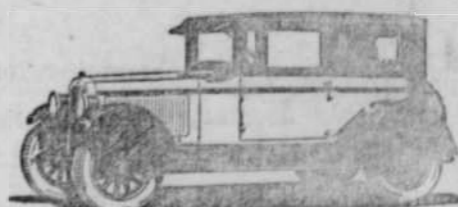
