Boulder by Auto

The Journal is in receipt of the following letter from Mrs. W. W. Foster descriptive of their trip from Nyssa to Boulder, Colo., and as it will doubtless be interesting to their other friends as well as the Journal we publish it:

Boulder, Colo., April 18, 1928.
Dear Mr. Brown:
We arrived on Wednesday afternoon and thank the Lord for a safe journey and that everyone is well.

We left Nyssa on Tuesday afternoon. One plane was still flying when we got in Boise. Spent the night with the McCarty's. They are happy and well located. Visited with Harry Cosh at the Bristol. He had just brought his son John home from the hospital. He was much better after a brief but very serious attack of pneumonia poisoning. We drove to Filer (149 miles) and spent the night with our sister, Mrs. Harper. The next morning we took her, Rachel and Paul with us, making ten in all. We found our "prairie schooner" comfortable riding and water proof in the rain. They opened the nice camp at Pocatello for us (137 miles that day). Lost some time because we forgot to get gas. Fine roads that far.

Friday the roads from Hot Springs to Soda Springs were so bad we covered only 70 miles. Camped with only soda water from the spring, well known for its medicinal value. Got stuck in the mud before we got out of town the next morning and had to be pulled out.

Saturday was a warm day and we surely enjoyed the ride around beautiful Bear Lake in Utah. They said the Cokerville road was almost impassable. Leaving Lake Town, Utah, we took the cutoff to Sage, Wyo., where we camped out in the open. This cutoff was quite steep in places. It took us one hour to make four miles and we made but 90 that day.

Sunday morning we hoped to get to Kemmerer for Sunday school, but had a flat tire and were late. This is a coal mining town where they had the awful accident and so many were killed two years ago. We stopped to cook dinner, and took our time, drove late and made only 75 miles. Camped on a barren piece of shale land at Green River, the only accommodations they have.

Sold six cases of comb honey at Rock Springs, as our cash was about gone. Drove 70 miles over barren country before we reached a gas station at Warmwater, then 45 on in to Rawlins. (121 that day). Our only interest was the big new signalling lights and landing places for the air mail, which we saw the next morning.

Rawlins has the dandiest camp, with natural gas, laundry, hot and cold water, and even the luxury of shower baths. What fun for the children! We were all under cover, and how thankful we were, as it was showing hard when we got up. We soon drove out of it and the highways were clear but rough, with snow banks beside the road. It was very cold riding that day over the mountains by Medicine Bow to Laramie (125 miles). Had three tires flat. Put up at the cabin in the auto park, but the water froze on the buckets inside.

The drive to Fort Collins was wonderful, thru our beloved Rocky mountains. Could see snow covered Long's peak. How good it seemed to get home again. We made about 950 miles on about 90 gallons of gas. Carried about 1000 pounds of baggage and about 1000 pounds of folks. We expect to start back about May 4. With kindest regards,

A Nyssaite's Views

A Nyssaite in a communication to the Oregon Journal relieves himself as follows:

"The indications are that something will be done for irrigation in Oregon this year and as the Owyhee project is considered one of the best and most feasible in the West we expect something to be done on this project, especially so since settlers have been waiting 20 years for Uncle Sam to act. There is just one objection to completing the Owyhee, Vale and Black Canyon projects, and that is that the products—cattle, hogs, sheep, hay, grain, potatoes, onions, lettuce, apples, peaches, prunes, berries, etc., will be so great that the United States cannot consume them. However, if you don't allow the bridge to be built across the river between Portland and the sea maybe by doubling the tracks of railroad from Eastern Oregon to Portland we can ship products to Portland and have the big steamers load for foreign ports at Portland."

TALKING HONEY

Bees aren't at all choicé in their selection of a home. They would just as soon take a hollow tree or the space between the walls of a building for their home as to occupy the finest painted hive that a beekeeper can make. They often find lodgment under houses, between the rafters or in chimneys, and in at least one instance on record they found a home in the firebox of a temporarily abandoned locomotive.

It is when they find entrance to some part of a house that they become the greatest nuisance, and it is sometimes no easy matter to get rid of them. Beekeepers are often called on for assistance in such cases, and the problem is not always easy of solution.

If there are only one or two holes or cracks where the bees can enter, the simplest way is to close these up entirely with strips or shavings of cloth, thus imprisoning the bees. This should be done late in the evening after the bees are all inside. In time they will die and create no odor. If one can find or make an entrance in the wall above where the bees are located, and pour into it a couple of ounces of carbon disulphide, to be had at any drug store, then close the hole tightly, the fumes will kill them in a few hours. This is an easy way to rid a chimney of them also. Care must be taken in the use of this chemical, for it is explosive and inflammable.

Strong burning sulphur fumes forced into their home is safer, but not so easy to accomplish. If in the side of a house or between floors, probably the best and easiest way is to wait until quite cold weather, when the bees are dormant and stiff, then remove some of the boards and the bees and honey can be gotten at without danger. If at all timid you can put on a veil and gloves.

Only a practical beekeeper can remove bees from a building in summer, and he is usually far too busy to undertake it then.
