THE SONS OF GOD

In trying to explain the Bible statement that the sons of God married the daughters of men Mr. Chapman takes a position that for downright inanity and foolishness beats anything that even he has heretofore been able to achieve in that line—which is going some, as those who have followed him through his many weary columns will admit. He first makes the statement that by the sons of God is meant the family of Seth, and by the daughters of men is meant the descendants of Cain. He makes not the slightest effort to prove his claim. It all rests upon his unsupported word. But it is in his claim that the descendants of Cain were, and necessarily must be wicked that he shows his ignorance of the Bible and Bible teaching. Adam and Eve sinned as greatly at least as did Cain, yet they were the parents of Seth who, Mr. Chapman says, was "professedly religious." The rule didn't seem to work in his case. Enoch was the son of "apostate Cain," and Enoch was so "religious" that he was translated direct to heaven. Another case where Mr. Chapman's rule didn't work. In the 7th chapter of 1 Corinthians, 14th verse, we read:

"For the unbelieving husband is SANCTIFIED by the wife, and the unbelieving wife is sanctified by the husband; else were your children unclean; but now are they holy."

According to the "inerrant Bible" the sons of God would have sanctified their wayward wives and their children would have been holy. Mr. Chapman was wrong, both as to his facts and his conclusion. The Standard Bible Dictionary says the account of the sons of God marrying the daughters of men was probably a fragment of heathen mythology incorporated into the Genesis narrative.

There are a number of questions Mr. Chapman has attempted to answer that we will notice as fast as time and space will permit.

TALKING HONEY

"Are you sure there is no glucose in this honey?"

I am frequently asked this question. I'll answer: There is not; either in my honey or in any other honey sold in this part of the country, and probably not in the United States.

Honey adulteration will put the offender right up against the federal government, and even if it did not it doesn't pay. There is much poor honey sold, but very little that is adulterated. "But," I am answered, "I understand that some beekeepers feed their bees glucose and the bees make honey out of it." Wrong. Beekeepers could feed glucose and get a substitute, but it would injure the bees, for bees eat much of what they gather. In early springtime beekeepers frequently have to feed their colonies to prevent starvation. For this purpose only the best grade of beet or cane sugar is used. And the bees have eaten it all long before real honey comes. Substitutes such as glucose, sorghum, and the syrup from sugar factories have been tried as bee food during war times, but the results were always unsatisfactory or disastrous.

A few years ago, at the Colorado agricultural college, Dr. Gillette experimented with sugar feeding to produce honey, the results showed that he had to feed nearly three pounds of pure sugar to produce one pound of honey product. The latter was water clear, and tasted just like what it was—sugar syrup. Anybody could distinguish that it was not honey.

Bees sometimes store sweets that are not honey. My next story will tell you something about honeydew.

Mr. Chapman Continues Discussion

The woman and the serpent. The fall of Man was effected by the seductions of a serpent. That it was a real serpent is evident from the plain and artless style of the story; and from the many allusions made to it in the New Testament. BUT, the material serpent was the instrument or tool of a higher agent—Satan or the Devil—from whom the sacred writers apply from this incident the reproachful name of "The Serpent," "The Old Dragon." Though Moses makes no mention of this wicked spirit, giving only the history of the visible world, yet in the fuller discoveries of the Gospel, it is distinctly intimated that Satan was the author of the plot. (John 8:44; 2:2; Cor. 11:3; 1 John 3:8; Tim. 2:4; and Rev. 20:2). Serpents are proverbial for wisdom (Matt. 10:16). But these reptiles were at first, probably, far superior in beauty as well as in sagacity to what they are in their present state. There being, in the pure bosoms of the first pair, no principle of evil to work upon, a solicitation to sin could come only from without, as in the analogous case of Jesus Christ (Matt. 4:3). And as the tempter could not assume the human form, there being only Adam and Eve in the world, the agency of an inferior creature had to be employed. The Dragon Serpent seemed to be the fittest for the vile purpose; and the devil was allowed by Him who permitted the trial, to bring articulate sounds from its mouth. (See how the mouth of the dumb ass was "opened" to reprove the prophet (Num. 22:13).

Oh, the depth of darkness into which unbelief will lead! It would seem improbable that the Journal would renege or desire an answer to the next—unless the spirit that closed the query actuated and inspired it. "Was it scientific for the sons of God to marry the daughters of men? Any of our readers understand it quite well.

By the sons of God is meant the family of Seth, who were professedly religious; by the daughters of men, the descendants of apostate Cain. Mixed marriages between parties of opposite principles were and always have been necessarily sources of extensive corruption. These women, irreligious themselves, would, as wives and mothers, exert an influence fatal to the existence of religion in their household, and consequently the people of that later age sank to the lowest depravity, bringing on the judgment of the flood, described in the very same chapters. And we find its counterpart in 1 John 3:2. Beloved, now are we the Sons of God, and in 1 Cor. 3:3, are ye not carnal and walk as men?"
