Owyhee Project Bill Passed both Houses

Mr. Van Petten was up from Ontario Wednesday evening and addressed a meeting of Nyssa citizens on the subject of the Owyhee project. Mr. Van Petten has just returned from Washington, D. C., where he has been working in the interest of the project, and reports that the fight is practically won. The bill has passed both houses of congress and is in the conference committee, where a few minor differences are being adjusted. When this is done it will be ready for the president's signature, and there is no fear expressed that he will refuse to sign. It is estimated that it will require from three to four months to get through the preliminary legal work, such as the signing of contracts, etc., following which actual construction work will begin, as the bill makes mandatory the beginning of construction at once.
