Death of Andy Kirk

The death of "Andy" Kirk occurred on Monday, May 3, 1926, at the home of his brother Arda, after a brief illness. Burial services were held Wednesday at the Methodist church, conducted by the pastor, Rev. Hershey, attended by a large number of sorrowing relatives and friends. Interment was in the Ontario cemetery.

Andrew Allison Kirk was born December 26, 1895, at Colchester, Illinois, and died May 3, 1926, at Nyssa, Oregon, being 30 years, 4 months and 8 days old at the time of his death. He moved to Beggs, Oklahoma, in 1905 and to Nyssa in 1918. He leaves to mourn his loss a mother, Mrs. Ella Kirk, four sisters—Mrs. C. D. Simpson of Home-dale, Ida., Mrs. R. H. Martin, Nyssa, Or., Mrs. Edward Warren, Nyssa, Or., Miss Nellie Kirk, Nampa, Ida., five brothers—Walter Kirk, Chicago, Ill., Stacy Kirk, Beggs, Okla., John Kirk, Yuba City, Cal., Arda Kirk, Nyssa, Or., William Kirk, Weiser, Ida. His father, Allison A. Kirk, died October 25, 1916.
