TALKING HONEY

In ancient times honey, being the only sweet then known, was used in every kind of cookery and confection. With the invention of cane sugar, sorghum and other cane products, the use of honey in cookery diminished materially, not only because of the higher price of honey in comparison, but also because of the greater convenience of the powdered sweet. During the war, with sugar almost unobtainable, honey became the popular substitute and was again extensively used in cooking. Due to a lack of knowledge of the best way of using honey, and its limitations in cookery, when sugar again became plentiful there was an almost immediate turn to the better known sweetening.

Honey is not a satisfactory sweetening for many kinds of cookery. But many foods, likewise, can be made more delicious with the use of honey than with sugar. It is fine for use with the more tart fruits, but should never be used with those that are flat or naturally sweet. Nothing is finer for grape fruit than a liberal helping of honey. Oranges and peaches, cranberries and logan berries sweetened with honey are delicious. Rhubarb and gooseberries are much improved by being sweetened with honey. Honey makes the finest taffy, and there's nothing richer than a "honey Sundae" at a soda fountain. Many kinds of cakes and cookies are much improved by using honey instead of sugar. In my next talk I will give a few standard recipes for honey cookery.
