GREAT SESQUI STADIUM OPENED AT PHILADELPHIA

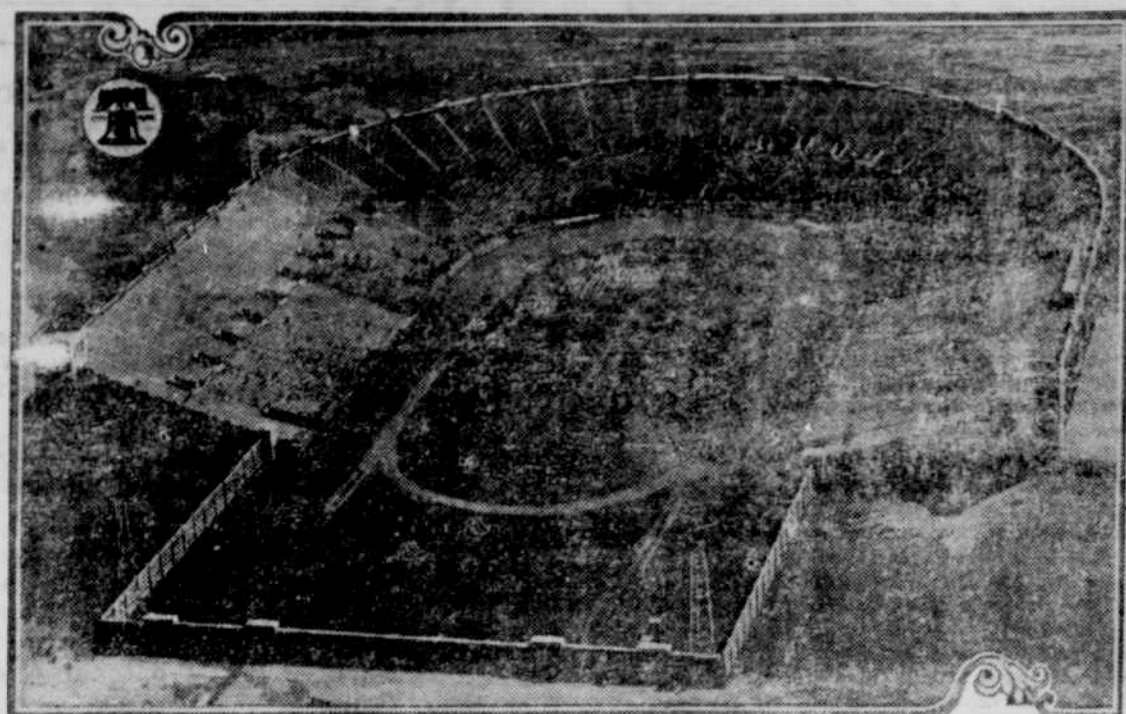

The giant arena in the centre of the Sesqui-Centennial International Exposition site in Philadelphia was built in approximately 300 working days. It was completed and in use a month before the opening of the big exposition which celebrates the 150th anniversary of the signing of the Declaration of Independence. This photograph, made from the air, shows nearly 3,000 boys on the playing field, massed there for the dedicatory exercises on May 1 which formally opened the structure. In the stands are seated 10,000 persons watching the program. A group of 10,000 persons in a large crowd but they are only a "drop in the bucket" in the big Philadelphia stadium. The boys paraded onto the field to the accompaniment of fourteen bands and there went through their drills and athletic exercises for the benefit of city officials and parents.

SPECIAL ELECTION NOTICE
Owyhee Irrigation District

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that a special election will be held on Saturday, the 3rd day of July, 1926, in the Southeast Quarter of the North east Quarter (SE 1/4 NE 1/4) of Section Twenty-six (26), Township Nineteen (19) South, Range Forty-six (46) East of the Willamette Meridian in the County of Malheur and State of Oregon, said voting place being about three miles northwest of Nyssa, Oregon, within the Owyhee Irrigation District in Malheur County, Oregon, at which there will be submitted to the electors of said District, the question whether said District shall be authorized to enter into contract with the United States providing for the construction of the Owyhee Project by the United States, and the payment of a proportionate part of the actual cost thereof by the District, said proportionate part of such cost to be determined as in said contract provided, and the total construction obligation of the District not to exceed the sum of \$13,000,000.00.

A copy of the draft of said proposed contract approved as to form by the Secretary of the Interior, is on file with the Secretary of said District and may be examined by any person interested.

The polls shall be opened at 8 o'clock in the morning of the day of election and kept open until 5 o'clock in the afternoon, when the same shall be closed.

At such election the ballots shall contain the words: "Contract with the United States—Yes," and "Contract with the United States No." Said election shall be held, and the results thereof determined in all respects as nearly as practicable in conformity with the provisions of law governing the election of irrigation

district officers.
