TALKING HONEY

It was the custom in ancient Egypt to place dishes of food in the tombs of the departed, for their sustenance pending the time of the resurrection. Among the dishes of various foods, meats, fruits and vegetables that are part of the exhibit, is an earthen pot of honey. And the tomb from which it was taken in 1920, was 4000 years old! I didn't get a chance to taste that honey, but I would have risked germs and everything for just a teeny weeny taste! But I'll wager it isn't as good as our fine American honeys. And not nearly as clean!
